Mr. Strahalm has over 15 years of experience in the field of specialized and high speed photography. During his years in photography he held positions as Range Systems Foreman on the El Centro Parachute test range; Optics Foreman on Inland Test Range, Pacific Missile Range, Dugway, Utah; and Precision Optical Range Foreman, Edward Air Force Base. Presently Mr. Strahalm is

assisting the Department of the Navy in underwater research as Assistant Head of the Photo Optics Section of Advance Systems Branch; Underwater Ordnance Department at the U. S. Naval Ordnance Test Station, Pasadena. He is conducting underwater optical range for the Posiedon Program and underwater high speed motion picture metric data gathering on the Posiedon

Missile. His work on Sea Lab 2 and future work on Sea Lab 3 include design, evaluation and operation of all optics and the entire support of documentary film, both movie and still, at depths of 400 to 600 feet by remote control from surface support vessel.
