OFFICERS SAID the girl had stopped for a boulevard stop at 220th Street and struck from the rear by the Johnson vehicle. Johnson told officers he had applied his brakes, but could not bring his vehicle to a stop because of wet pavement.

Police Sgt. James Popp told the Press-Herald Torrance had experienced no major traffic accidents since the storm began, but reported some flooding in the north Torrance area.

Some flooding also was reported on Spencer Street, where a new city road project is under way. Minor flooding was reported in several intersections, although no major damage had been reported.
