

Qualified Accountants in Short Supply

If you're counting on hiring a certified public accountant next February to take care of your income tax before the April 15 deadline, think twice.

There's a shortage of qualified tax accountants so it would be much wiser to seek their services by Nov. 30. If you wait until the end of December you'll encounter the traditional "rush," and if you let it go beyond that, you just might not find a seasoned tax accountant.

There are two other important reasons for engaging a CPA by the end of November:

(1) Year-end tax selling must, of course, be done by the end of the year. To take

advantage of all the law allows, a tax accountant should be on hand now to direct you through complexities without risk.

(2) There is a possibility of higher tax rates next year, and if you can, you probably will want to put some 1967 income into 1966. Another point: you might want to defer some deductions to next year when they might be worth more.

A good tax man can make sure you are getting the best possible tax advantages the law allows. This involves capital gains, charitable donations, real estate, investments, etc. By planning ahead with your tax accountant, the chances are that April 15 will turn out to be a pleasant

spring day instead of a time of crisis.

Auctioneers are fast talkers, so if an argument develops after a sale, who's right? At an upstate New York livestock auction bidding is tape recorded to help resolve later disagreements.

Further evidence that air conditioning is a year-round business is being recorded this year as the industry marches ahead to new sales records in the waning months of 1966. Despite the sharp decline in home building, a tight credit supply and cool weather at the beginning of the peak season, industry spokesmen estimate sales this

year will top those of 1965 by at least 10 per cent.

At the present rate, factory shipments of central residential systems this year should exceed 600,000 units for the first time, compared with about 551,000 units in 1965, according to Lester G. Porter, president of Borg-Warner, whole York division is a major producer of such equipment for homes, commercial buildings and automobiles.

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
