

Union Bank Staff Offers Experience in All Areas

Seven well-experienced Union Bankers will serve the public in the bank's new South Bay Regional Head Office, which opens tomorrow in the Del Amo Financial Center.

Heading the staff is John M. Heidt, regional vice president, who has held the position since the opening of the bank's temporary headquarters in May, 1966.

Heidt came to the bank in 1959 after earning a BA degree in economics from Stanford University and attending the Pacific Coast Banking School in Seattle, Wash., where he graduated with honors and was elected president of his class. He was promoted to vice president and served as a commercial loan officer in 1963 until his appointment as regional vice president.

Michael H. Baillie, assistant vice president in charge of real estate loans, joined the bank in 1962 after extensive experience with a stock brokerage firm. He was graduated from USC and holds a bachelor of sciences degree in marketing. He also did graduate work in the Mortgage Finance School of the Ohio Graduate School of Business.

Assembly Committee Eyes Humboldt County for Park

SACRAMENTO — The Redwood-Prairie Creeks area of Humboldt County is the choice of the Assembly committee on natural resources, headed by Assemblyman Edwin L. Z'berg (D-Sacramento) for the establishment of a redwoods national park.

The committee made the recommendation in a lengthy report called "Conflict in the Redwoods." Z'berg said it is the result of an intense study.

The report recommended that acreage of the park be determined by a study commission. Various acreages have been suggested.

Reagan asked that the national forest service turn over 14,491 acres to a private lumber company.

In return, the government would have acquired an area for park purposes, which now is held by the firm.

HOWEVER, the Congress took no action on the national redwood park bill, and it is not expected to be brought up again before next year.
