

Area Woman Dies After Lung Attack

Lung congestion has been listed as the probable cause of death of Torrance housewife Mary Taylor Gryder, 3580 Sara Drive.

Mrs. Gryder telephoned her husband, Julian C. Gryder, at work early Friday afternoon and complained of having difficulty breathing.

When Gryder arrived home shortly thereafter, he found his wife unconscious and began to administer mouth-to-mouth resuscitation. The 55-year-old woman was pronounced dead on arrival to Little Company of Mary Hospital at 2 p.m.

She was taken to Stone and Myers Mortuary.
