Moratorium Lifted for One Project

The Torrance City Council voted Tuesday night to permit West American Construction Co. proceed with the construction of an industrial building on property which had previously been saddled with a building moratorium.

The Council voted, however, to extend for another 90 days the building moratorium on the remainder of the property. The land under moratorium is located between Lomita Boulevard, 235th Street, Madison Avenue, and a line between Early Avenue and Telo Avenue.

The Council indicated that extension of the moratorium is necessary to protect the rights-of-way for the southerly extension of Madrona and Maple Avenues pending a precise plan for development of the property.

NOELL MARBLE, executive director of TEA (Torrance Education Association), responded to the board decision in a statement to the Press-Herald. Marble said:

"Based upon the action of the board of education this evening, it is my personal opinion the board, not necessarily all members, individually, are (a) more interested in hardware than quality education; (b) interested in the best books, etc., but only mediocre teachers, thus mediocre education for children; (c) lying to the taxpayer-homeowner when they say they represent them, but reduce the taxes less than 60-cents a month and bank millions; (d) not representing the public, but a few wealthy individuals; (e) acting in an arbitrary and unilateral position without regard of the best interest of the children of Torrance."

MARBLE SAID meetings have been scheduled with every faculty in the district within three weeks to discuss continued unilateral decisions by the board.

The refusal of the board to fall

negotiate until a compromise is reached is unsatisfactory to Marble.

When asked if a teacher strike was possible, Marble answered, "In the ultimate extreme, yes!"

The board re-established almost \$500,000 cut from budget last summer. The money will go for special reading teachers next semester, textbooks, reference books, instructional supplies, replacement of equipment, and capital improvements.

There are eleven Junior Achievement Business Centers in Southern California. More than 4,000 high school students are expected to participate in the program this



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
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
