

COLLEGE REPORT

The Dominguez Hills campus opened its doors this fall to 460 students—tripling last year's enrollment of 150. They were greeted by an inundation of advice, direction, and charges as to their many responsibilities. Three of the most significant statements made came from the college president, the student body president, and a member of the faculty.

"Following is the welcoming statement of Dr. Leo F. Cain, the college president. "Welcome to California State College, Dominguez Hills. This newest and smallest of all California's 18 state colleges breathes excitement, challenge, confidence.

"You are in for a unique experience in undergraduate education—unique at least for these times of giant institutions with little time for the individual student. In the months to come you will encounter a meticulously designed curriculum, a vitally interested, available professoriate, and a philosophy of higher education aimed at the development of the whole student.

"Now, during these formative years of the college you hold not only a position of special influence but also an opportunity to participate in the creation of a major institution of higher learning.

"The experience that will come, I am sure, will be challenging and productive."

STUDENT Body President Rich Thomas made the following statement to new students: "As you enter California State College, Dominguez Hills, you will notice many different things. This is an unusual college and its difference is manifested in a multitude of ways.

"First in importance is the emphasis placed on you as an individual. The entire structure and philosophy is centered around the individual student and his quest for education. You will find in your years here that the primary concern of your professors, the motivation of the administrative process and the general concern of the college is directed to the student.

"The history of the land the college is located on is a history of individuals. From the original recipient of the land grant Rancho San Pe-

dro, Juan Jose Dominguez, through succeeding generations of the Dominguez family, to the pioneers of California State College, Dominguez Hills, these individuals have met and overcome a challenge. You are now an individual in that history.

"While our challenge is not the same that Don Juan Jose faced, it is just as real. Our challenge is to pioneer a new concept of total student involvement in the affairs of our academic community. We as students are given the opportunity to share in the decision making process of our campus. How we meet this challenge is up to us. We must produce not only in the classroom, but also in our broader role as members of the academic community.

"Let us begin!"

ALSO SPEAKING was John K. Foote, chairman of the Academic Senate.

"On behalf of the faculty of California State College, Dominguez Hills, I would like to especially welcome you to our college community. It is our hope and aim to make the challenges which you meet here exciting and rewarding.

"On the surface a college appears to consist of lectures and tests given by the faculty along with lecture notes and tests written by the students. However, as we dig deeper we find that an extremely complex community exists whose major purpose is the preparation of students to contribute to, rather than merely exist in, our modern society. This campus is made up of administration, faculty and students, each playing their own role. Unfortunately these roles become confused on many college campuses.

"Here at Dominguez Hills we feel that we have effectively integrated these groups by cross representation on various boards and committees. The responsibility of developing a successful college is therefore also placed on the shoulders of you, the students. Not only are you expected to fulfill your academic commitments, but also you are called upon to contribute to the welfare of the overall campus through participation in student activities. Both you and your college will gain from such participation."
