The Spartans had a low score of 27 to edge Mira Costa's 52 points. The race was won by Bob Ritchie of Hawthorne in 11 minutes flat.


Decker Underwood of South was second in 11:04.

Motorcycle Racing Is Real Battle

It appears likely the battle in all three motorcycle racing divisions — expert, amateur and novice — will go down to the wire in the 1967 motorcycle chase at Ascot.

Dan Haaby, BSA-mounted charger from Lawndale, is in the driver's seat as of today in the expert race. But Mel Lacher, Harley-Davidson ace from San Diego is a close second. And BSA pilot Sammy Tanner, Long Beach, and Chuck Jones, Arcadia, are a threat for the top spot.

Phil Todd, Ojai, is the amateur leader of the moment. But in close contention are Jan Crawford, Garden Grove, and Gary Waldo, Long Beach. Rick Ellisarranas, Atascadero, and Dave Smith, Lakewood, are head-to-head in the novice category. And the hottest novice rider in the West is Rick Durkee, the Suzuki ace from Bellflower.

Durkee has posted track records for novices in his last two outings over the 183rd and Vermont Avenue oval. Haaby was less than one second off the 15-lap mark, so the track maintenance people must be doing a good job.

Douglas Cup Regatta Slated in Long Beach

Five of the country's top collegiate sailing teams and one from Canada will compete here in match races during the second annual Douglas Cup Regatta Saturday and Sunday.

Joining defending champion California State College at Long Beach will be teams from Stanford University, Tulane University, University of California at Santa Barbara, University of Southern California and University of British Columbia.

Races will be run in open ocean waters just off the south-eastern end of the Long Beach Harbor breakwater. The event is a part of the fall festival. The Long Beach Yacht Club will be host for the entire regatta.
