The event will take place at the South High School Cafetorium, in Torrance, on Thursday evening, Oct. 26, beginning at 7:15 p.m. The public is invited to attend, free of charge.

"The Team Approach to Reading Disabilities" will be the theme for the evening. The aim of this Forum is to establish a better understanding of the total needs of children with achievement problems, according to Dr. and Mrs. Edwin L. Glover, presidents of the Society and Auxiliary.

Dr. A. N. Posner, assistant superintendent, educational services, of the Torrance Unified School District, will give a welcome and introduce the speakers.

Milton Tobias, M.D., will give a lecture titled "The Other Side of the Coin, If Blank, It's Not Valid Nor Negotiable." Dr. Tobias is a pediatrician who specializes in non-conforming, non-achieving children. He is currently writing a book to be entitled "What's Wrong With My Child?"

Howard Walton, M.S., O.D., will speak on "Vision Perception Problems." Dr. Walton is an associate professor of the Los Angeles College of Optometry, and also serves on the faculty of the Culver City Adult School, teaching developmental and rapid reading.

Peter Spencer, Ph.D., Doctor of Ocular Science, will lecture on "Educational Optics and Interprofessional Responsibility." Dr. Spencer is a professor of education at Claremont Graduate School and California State College in Los Angeles. He is the author of standardized tests in the field of geography and mathematics, and co-author of "Building Mathematical Competence in the Elementary School," rated as an outstanding book for 1966 by Pi Lambda Theta national commission.
