

St. Bernard's Vikes Heads for CRL Title

St. Bernard's is heading for possibly its first Camino Real League football championship after beating Bishop Montgomery, 14-6, Friday night, at Westchester.

The Vikings scored in the first and third quarters to take a 14-0 lead.

Crespi beat Fermin Lasuen 14-0, to remain unbeaten alongside St. Bernard's. It was the second loss for Lasuen, once mentioned as a championship favorite.

Montgomery travels to Crespi next week. During the last two years they traded championships.

"St. Bernard's wanted the game more than our kids

did," Coach George Swade of Bishop Montgomery said. "They deserved to win."

The Vikings came out fired up and scored the first time they got the ball. It was a 60-yard drive with Mike Swideraki going two yards for the first of his two touchdowns.

St. Bernard's played ball control. The team had 61 plays to 21 for Montgomery.

The Vikes ground out a second touchdown drive in the third quarter with Swideraki scoring again from the two.

Montgomery stopped three times with pass intercep-

tions, finally went 70 yards in the third quarter. QB Greg Collins fired a 14-yard pass to Steve Patterson for the touchdown.

Although St. Bernard's controlled the ball, the total yardage was 178 to 180 for the victors.

Swade said the Vikings played the kind of inspired game that wins, but with so many good football teams in the league this year, the coach does not believe the champion will be unbeaten.

Junior Colleges Troubled Over Relegating Decision

The threat of withdrawal from the California Junior College Association by six Eastern Conference schools has resulted in reconsideration of proposed relegating for 1968-69.

The Eastern Conference will have 11 members for all sports except football. For football, five conferences will each have eight members.

The "reconsideration" returns Cerritos College to the Metropolitan Conference. The Metro will have the same eight members for all sports and will include Bakersfield, Cerritos, El Camino, Los Angeles Pierce, Los Angeles Valley, Long Beach, Pasadena and Santa Monica.

Pierce and Pasadena will replace East Los Angeles and Rio Hondo.

One new league will comprise Fullerton JC, Mt. San Antonio, Orange Coast, Santa Ana, and Golden West — all from the Eastern; San Diego

CC and San Diego Mesa from the Pacific Southwest, plus Rio Hondo of the Metropolitan Conference.

The other football league will consist of Chaffey, Citrus, Cypress, Riverside CC and San Bernardino Valley of the Eastern, plus Grossmont, Palomar, and Southwestern of the PSC.

For all other sports, the five PSC teams will continue to compete in their present leagues. The ten Eastern teams will do the same but also add Rio Hondo as an eleventh team.

Former PSC member Mira Costa will be given the option of returning from the Desert Conference to the Pacific Southwest for other than football. Otherwise the Desert will be an eight team league for all sports, including Antelope Valley, Barstow, College of the Desert, Imperial Valley, Mt. San Jacinto, Palo Verde, and Victor Valley.

Northern California will operate with the six leagues as aligned at last May's meeting of the State Athletic Committee (effective in the fall of 1968).

Relegating Committee Chairman Chet DeVore explained the reasons for the change thusly: "This action was taken with much reluctance because of the action of six Eastern Conference colleges who did not accept the proposed (May) alignment and

who planned to withdraw from the California JC Association and form their own conference."

DeVore, superintendent of Southwestern College near San Diego continued, "If these six colleges do not accept the new plan, the S.A.C. plans to take sanctions against them and relegate without them along the lines of the proposal passed in May."

The affected colleges, however, have indicated they will accept the compromise.

A Tie is Graceful Way of Losing!

"A tie is just a graceful way of losing."

That terse, somewhat bitter statement sums up Ram flanker Bernie Casey's feelings about the past two weeks and the coming game in Chicago today against George Halas' Bears.

Casey was the big man in both Ram tie games in their latest contests, as well as in a 30-30 tie in Chicago last year while with the San Francisco 49ers. Bernie's brilliant end-zone catch in the closing minutes of the game in Baltimore two weeks ago gave the Rams a 24-24 stand-off with the Colts, and his last-minute reception in the goal-line corner last Sunday brought the club to a 28-28 finish with the Washington Redskins.

With the Rams preparing for their annual invasion of Wrigley Field this weekend, Casey's thoughts reverted to last season's 49er clash with the Bears, when two clutch catches by the lanky flanker in the fourth quarter led first to a touchdown and then to a field goal as the 49ers pulled even with the Chicagoans.

That was Casey's greatest game of his seven-year pro career. He caught 12 passes

for 225 yards, the best performance by a receiver in the NFL last year.

But those statistics mean nothing to Bernie. "I'm not statistic-minded. The only thing that matters to me is whether we win or lose. All we got in Chicago was a tie, and a tie is disenchanting," he explained in his polished English.

However, his outstanding effort in that game augurs well for the Rams. Casey has usually done well against the Bears. The year before he caught two touchdowns passes as the 49ers overwhelmed the easterners, 52-24. And Bernie usually is at his best in the last half of the season.

"I've always been a slow starter," he said. "This season, being with a new team and having to learn a new system, I've probably gotten off even more slowly. But I'm getting better. I had my best game of the year against the Redskins."

Casey has always caught a lot of passes. Except for his rookie year, when he played very little, he averaged 53 receptions a year with the 49ers for a 14.3-yard average per catch. With the Rams so far this season he has 23 catches for a 16.9 average. His top performance was in 1965 when he hauled in 59 throws to finish fifth in the league. Eight were for touchdowns.

"I'm aiming at 60 receptions this year. If Gabe (Roman Gabriel) keeps throwing to me, I'll catch 'em."
