

Inglewood Invades North High Friday

The high scoring game for the Bay League football campaign belongs to Inglewood with 40 points. The Sentinels powered through Redondo for a 40-14 victory after losing to Santa Monica, 24-12, and Mira Costa, 13-7.

With momentum building, Inglewood will strike next at North High Friday night. The match will bring together two of the three best quarterbacks in the Bay League when

Warren Rosten goes on display against North's Dan Hansen.

North (2-0-1) holds a slim league lead over Mira Costa and Hawthorne, the surprise runners up with 2-1 records.

Hawthorne's grasp on second place will be tested by Santa Monica (2-2) while Mira Costa can figure on a dog fight with Redondo at El Camino Stadium. Mira Costa owns the third quarterback Pat Moore.

South (2-1-1) has a non-

league game with Serra. Although the Sentinels came late to the party, their appetite for winning may warrant a big helping against North. The hungriest man in Inglewood is Coach Dave Nakaya who became the third coach of the Sentinels in two decades to take over after the start of the season. The Sentinels, therefore, are just becoming accustomed to Nakaya's system.

North leaves some doubts as to their true ability due to

repeated defensive deficiencies. But about the time the Saxons start to drag, a youngster Rick Creighton comes to the rescue with the big play at cornerback on defense or by making a sensational run.

Only Santa Ana Valley and Morningside had much luck containing Creighton this year and in those games North lost.

For the middle of the season it is unusual to have so many teams in contention, but it increases potential upsets. Experts believe Inglewood can beat North and Hawthorne can upset Santa Monica.

Santa Monica, the preseason favorite, however, is not ready to play dead. Coach Dick Turner of the Vikes has a lot of young talent that will make him a winner in future years, but rather than discount 1967, Turner said after losing to North there is a lot of fine football to play this year.

"Not only are we looking to the future, but I think we have a real fine football team this year," said Turner. He brought out the fact injuries and fumbles have been unusually numerous this year at Samohi.

First Come, First Served

How much is a bleacher seat at a high school football game worth?

Fans who sometimes are reluctant to pay an adult admission of \$1.50 or 75 cents for children under 12 years have been advised the charges defray the costs of most of the athletic program.

"Admission prices paid by sports fans to high school football games support the total athletic program for the year in both major and minor sports, stated Dr. John A. Lucas, South High principal.

He said, "Tax monies, voted by the public and controlled by the Board of Education, are not spent of these athletic activities.

Students who purchase Student Body cards (cost averages approximately \$5) are admitted free to all high school events and activities. The fee for A.S.B. cards supports a minimum program of student activities. Special events, such as homecoming activities and class proms, requiring the expenditure of extra monies often times necessitate further charges to the students.

Admission rates for athletic events are agreed upon and established by schools participating in the league.

League members estimate the expenses for staging league football games at approximately \$300 per event. This amount pays for four officials, a doctor, a scorer, police and faculty supervision, the public address announcer, a cameraman and film developing, and decorations and special signs.

Additional expenses are incurred for away games in rosters' buses and supervision.

Home schools take from the gate receipts \$300, after which both schools split the remaining balance. While a definite profit is usually shown, it was pointed out football games pay for the rest of the athletic program in track, baseball, wrestling, tennis, cross country, and competition of the Girls' Athletic Association, for which no admission is charged. Basketball, reportedly, holds its own financially.

Torrance Is Host To Centaurs

Torrance High will be host to Culver City in a Sky League football game Friday night.

Culver City has made a bid to become the No. 2 team in the Sky League.

The Cantaurus beat Leuzinger, 21-7 last Friday evening. Only a week before Leuzinger downed Torrance, 20-12.

West Joins Top Ten; Gets Set for Lennox

For winning six straight football games the West High Warriors have moved up among the Top 10 schools in the CIF "AAA" rankings.

The Warriors do not expect more than a "warm up" session Friday against a Lennox team whose only victory was 21-19 over Lutheran High. The best game by the Lancers, however, was 45-21 against a Lawndale team expected to play West for the Pioneer League championship Nov. 17.

There has been talk of moving the "Big Game" to some place like El Camino Stadium. The game is set for Leuzinger High at the end of the season.

For the first time in years the Pioneer League champion has been elevated to the CIF "AAA" playoffs which involves a 16-team bracket.

The reason West High looms as a serious threat to dethrone CIF "AA" and Pioneer champion Lawndale is its feared running game. Dave Boyd has run for 20 touch-

downs and 929 yards in six games. He is reinforced by Halfback Dan Whelan, another hard runner, and Quarterback Coy Hall, a junior.

West unleashed a 72-14 romp of El Segundo last weekend while Lennox lost to Palos Verdes Saturday night by a 19-0 score.

Lawndale will feed on Palos Verdes Friday afternoon on the Peninsula. The Cardinals have won 15 straight games since losing to Bishop Montgomery a year ago, 24-6.

Knights Travel To Crespi

Bishop Montgomery High School's Knights have a string of four years in which they have scored against each football opponent.

That achievement is in jeopardy Friday night when Crespi engages Montgomery at its Encino campus.


The Celts have the distinguished record of giving up only one touchdown in six games this year. They were scored on only by Santa Paula, a northern powerhouse, in a 27-7 victory.

Crespi has whitewashed Thousand Oaks, Alemany, Verbum Dei, Murphy and Fernin Lasuen.

Montgomery, rebuilding after an 11-1 record in 1966, has won four of six games including a 31-16 win over Lasuen.

A Crespi win over Montgomery will eliminate the Knights from contention and set the stage for a Crespi-St. Bernard's decider.

Coach George Swade's Montgomery squad will try to upset the Celts with a dual running and passing attack. In last week's 14-6 loss to St. Bernard's, the Knights were beaten by the Vikings' ball control.

El Camino Risks Unbeaten Streak

The Metropolitan Conference football race has turned into an endurance test between El Camino and Bakersfield College. Both have 40 Metro records to go with their two non-conference victories.

Game No. 9 on Nov. 18 will match El Camino at Bakersfield for the championship.

The final game will be the showdown. More important to both schools at the moment are the two cards they draw the next two weekends.

El Camino faces a pesky East Los Angeles eleven (Sat.) and Rio Hondo (Nov. 11).

Bakersfield runs into dangerous Santa Monica this weekend and Valley on Nov. 11.

The other six contestants have lost at least two games apiece, so they can do no more than play the role of spoiler.

East L.A. was stopped by a strong defensive by Valley last Saturday, 19-6. The surprising East L.A. team, which whipped SMCC, 49-20, scored on Tom Hayes' 32-yard TD aerial to end Joe Galzarz against Valley.

Ken Swearingen, El Camino head coach, is not overlooking East L.A. as a possible threat to the Warriors. "East L.A. is a strong defensive team with a good quarterback and a quick backfield," Swearingen stated.

Cerritos (28-7) became the

sixth consecutive foe to fall to El Camino in its quest for the Metro title.

The Warriors scored on their second play from scrimmage.

Following up with three second quarter touchdowns, El Camino became the first team the Falcons faced in which there was no question which team was superior. Fullback Tom Reynolds, the conference triple threat, scored twice on pass plays, while halfback Steve Schmitz matched Reynolds' efforts from the ground. Reynolds hauled in 74 and 21 yard touchdown passes from quarterback Dana Clyde, while Schmitz scored on two one-yard plunges.

Clyde was successful in completing 11 of 19 passes for 213 yards and two touchdowns. Although reserve quarterback Jon Robertson only played during the last part of the fourth quarter, he rolled up 44 yards in seven carries.

Reynolds gained 92 yards rushing in 16 carries, while totaling 129 yards on five pass receptions. Schmitz gained 59 yards in 19 carries and brought in one pass for 22 yards.

Bill Vincent, line coach, was proud of the way the Warrior defensive team played against Cerritos. He singled out Terry Mendenhall, a freshman tackle, who totaled nine unassisted tackles and intercepted
