

Airline Discount Tickets Aimed at Neophyte Flyers

Careful fare shopping by air travelers often pays off handsomely when one is aware that airlines in the U.S. have a wide array of discount arrangements that include youth fare, military standby, family plan, shuttle, excursion, coach, night coach and weekend-travel rates.

Too often, even the experienced traveler in need of an airline ticket pays what he believes is the full price of the ticket without inquiring about a reduction.

However, the design of airlines' ticket discount plans is to lure the neophyte traveler. As an airline official recently put it, "bigger planes are coming. We have to entice people to fill up those seats."

ONE EXAMPLE of a flight saving a traveler can make is on a night-shift, round-trip ticket from New York to San Juan, P.R. This costs only \$90 while first-class, round-trip costs \$221.70.

One ticket office manager at a major airline recently stated, "the average person as an air traveler is unsophisticated but improving. He has some idea about the subject, but is not really sure what it is all about."

Airlines suggest several procedures for purchasing tickets, the principal one being to apply in person at offices rather than by telephone so the traveler can be fully aware of discount plans. Some adjustments may be worthwhile in view of the potential savings.

MOST OF the emphasis in the railroad carbuilding industry is on bigger and bigger freight cars. But ACF Industries has taken a long look at

the bakery industry and its needs as a result is introducing a "compact" Center Flow covered hopper car of 2,970 cubic feet capacity for delivering flour to bakeries.

"Some bakeries do not have the sidings or facilities for utilizing the big, new 'foodstuffs' cars of over 5,000 cubic feet capacity," says John S. Carlson, vice president of ACF and general manager of its Shippers' Car Line division. "Therefore we went in the other direction with a shorter car of smaller cube."

The bakers' compact model is about 36 feet long, some 20 feet shorter than the company's 5,250-cubic-foot version. A demonstration model of the car has been tested at many bakery sites in the Midwest during the last several months.

ALTHOUGH the Center Flow car is basically a general purpose dry bulk commodity transporter, other specialized versions have been made for the foodstuffs, carbon black, cement and plastic pellets industries. More than 20,000 Center Flow cars of all types have been ordered by railroads and private industry.

Golf carts are bouncing along outside the course to fulfill a variety of purposes other than carrying players through a round of golf. A television station is using carts to transport heavy cameras and other equipment from place to place. A known breeder of horses tours his stables not on a horse but by cart, and in Florida, retired senior citizens utilize them for shopping chores and other errands to avoid the need of an automobile. AMERICANS are not the only people who like the speed and convenience of pushbutton products. Europeans use up about 750 million cans a year and the Japanese about 120 million.

Commercial use of aerosols began just after World War II with lightweight versions of wartime "bug bombs" for killing insects. While insecticides still are a major factor in the aerosol field, hair sprays are now the top sellers both domestically and in Europe.

ONE OF THE newest uses

for the ubiquitous aerosol is the first "instant" foam for floor care, called "Pronto."

This was developed by the Johnson Wax Company to clean resilient flooring and dry to a shine in less than five minutes. The company calls it the "fastest way to do a floor."

The Polish government has told its citizenry that mistletoe exports this year will be an important balance-of-payments factor "because of the increased sexuality of the Anglo-Saxons," who "kiss under the hanging spring at Christmas time." . . . A plastic device soon to be introduced is designed to keep gulls and other birds from landing on a boat. The Gull Chaser is an 18-inch long rotating vane that spins freely on spike-like bearings. The slightest breeze starts a whirling action that sends the birds back into the blue.

Assignment TV

There is a great Sargasso Sea in the air above us composed of half-baked ideas from intellectuals, rubbish from the rabble rousers, and hot air from the "experts"—all heaviest by television. Occasionally an original thinker comes along who cuts through the flotsam and jetsam with simple ideas which are startlingly profound.

In one passionate hour, Eric Hoffer, one of the most fascinating men of our time, cleared the air with his own kind of exuberant anger expressing opinions from his viewpoint of the down-to-earth working man.

The program was a re-showing of the recent Eric Hoffer interview with the 65-year-old San Francisco longshoreman which started a run on his four books, got him an invitation to the White House and provided the President with an opening paragraph for one of his speeches.

Mr. Eisenhower has been one of his fans for a decade. I suspect Mr. Johnson just heard of him.

"A man could speak and write all his life and not accomplish what Hoffer accomplished in that one hour last September," said Seavard. "If I had done nothing in broadcasting these last 28 years I would feel the years well spent because of this one hour."

What Hoffer does is to cut through the scab of doubt about this country, its purpose and its future, to touch the nerve of faith about ourselves and our Nation. It is something like Churchill talking to the English people in dark times.

PASSION IS what he has plenty of, but it's a different brand from the one you are apt to see on television. "I can think of nothing better than going to bed with a half-finished paragraph!" he says, licking his lips.

Five years ago as part of my chores as host of a San Francisco-based television series titled "PM West" I interviewed Hoffer on what I believe was his first video appearance. I had been impressed with his book, "The Believer," and was prepared

with a list of questions to draw him out, a painful process which had been necessary on former shows with such light-weights as Shelley Berman, Phyllis Diller, and Andy Williams.

I used the first question and then threw the others out the window. Hoffer talked brilliantly and continuously through two shows with a joyful roar that was overwhelming.

IDEAS tumbled out all over the place and he jumped from one place to another with only a brief pause to mop his brow with a big red handkerchief. It was a wild ride for the producers, who refused to air the second show for fear the antennas might melt.

Since then viewers of the educational network across the country have come to know Hoffer through a series with James Day, but for the mass viewers the other night's show was his introduction and it was well worth the repeat.

It was pared down from a two-and-a-half hour taping made by CBS in San Francisco last May. A lot of his observations are familiar to those who have read his books and some are oversimplified, but they are always fascinating.

HE LETS THE "power-hungry intellectuals" have it, POW! "Let the men who work with their hands improve solutions and the bourgeoisie supervisors would prove superfluous. . . . Why do intellectuals hate LB? Because they don't like the common man. He's one of us and that's why I have faith in him."

On the students at UC: "When these two-bit intellectuals talk about the masses—they call them Pavlovian dogs and the mindless masses—it makes me furious. What do they know about us? We are the most mysterious people in the world. . . ."

I'm not so sure the common man he speaks for will recognize Hoffer as their spokesman, but Walt Whitman and George Bernard Shaw had the same problem, and that's not bad company to be in.
