Police Won't Put The Car Together

who left his late model car unlocked in the Del Amo Shopping Center.

After a month's investigation, Torrance police finally rounded up the skeletal remains of the car — a part here and a part there — but it's up to the owner to reassemble them! However, it's usually impossible to put the parts back together because some pieces are always ruined, according to Officer Don Feil of the Torrance police car theft detail.

December is the most active month for car thieves, Feil said. Holiday shoppers crowd shopping center parking lots. Careless drivers leave cars unlocked and even leave the keys.

"Lock Your Car" may sound like a worn-out slogan," Feil said, "but it's still the simplest, most effective means of preventing car theft."

The public can put a stop to auto theft by remembering the following rules, Feil said:

1. Lock your car;
2. Hide purchases in the trunk;
3. Remember where your car is parked;
4. Report suspicious persons seen loitering in car lots or tampering with any vehicle.

Chamber Manager On Board

Department of Commerce, has announced that the newly published catalog of Federal Assistance Programs has been received and is available for reference purposes to members and the general public. The catalog, which was directed by Congress, contains a broad and comprehensive listing of all domestic assistance programs of the Federal government. The volume is particularly useful for individuals and organizations seeking to locate and utilize assistance programs.

The catalog is not loaned out, but can be examined at the chamber library, 1510 Cravens Ave.

Victoria Street Improvement Set

Improvement of Victoria Street near Tamcliff Avenue has been authorized, Supervisor Kenneth Hahn said today.

Work will consist of widening the pavement on the north side of the roadway to provide a left-turn pocket.

Dates for Voter Registration Set

With local and statewide elections coming up this spring, registration information is currently being circulated. In order to vote, it is necessary to register at least 54 days before any given election.

A new resident must have lived in the state one year and the county for 90 days before the election date in order to register. Other requirements are that the person be at least 21 years of age, be able to read English, and be able to sign his name.

A naturalized citizen must have been a citizen for at least 90 days prior to the election date (March 6 is the deadline for the primary election).

Registration deadline for the June 4 primary is April 11.

Those who will want to register or re-register include:

1. Those who have changed their address since they last registered.
2. Those who have changed their name since they last registered.
3. Those who desire to change their party affiliation.
4. Those voters whose registrations were cancelled because they did not vote at the general election of 1966. (However, those who still live at the same address and who sent in the return postcard mailed to them by the Registrar of Voters after the 1966 general election cancellation, need not re-register.)
5. Those who have become of age and have not registered before.

Bids Due For New Sea Wall

County supervisors have approved plans and specifications for installation of another unit of the sea barrier projects in sections of Los Angeles, El Segundo, Hermosa Beach, and Torrance. Supervisor Burton W. Chace has announced.

Cost of the work is estimated at \$115,000.

Bids will be opened in the County Flood Control District offices Dec. 29. Supervisors are expected to award a contract about ten days later.

CHAICE SAID the unit involves drilling nine observation wells in depths ranging from 570 to 730 feet. They will be used to monitor effectiveness of the anti-brine project.

The wells will be spotted in an area generally bounded by Manchester Boulevard, Hawthorne Boulevard, Pacific Coast Highway, and the ocean.

Drilling is expected to get under way within 30 days after the contract award and will require approximately six months to complete.

OVER-ALL aim of the barrier project is to halt further encroachment of sea water into fresh supplies in an area along the coast from Imperial Highway south to the Palos Verdes Hills, Chace said.

Charter Members Honored

The Bethesda Assembly of God church will honor charter members of the church and its founders today at the morning worship service.

Bethesda Assembly of God was formerly Southside Assembly of Los Angeles, and began in a store building on West 108th Street in 1945. Soon after its beginning, property was purchased at El Segundo and Vermont where the congregation worshipped for many years.

In 1965 the congregation moved to 1473 W. 182nd St. in Gardena, where they now own one and one-half acres of land and operate a Christian day school.

Elwyn Lewis, pastor of the church for the past four years will conduct the service.


