SAN FRANCISCO — Acher. Then out! — into the friend in Auckland writes me: "The wowers (prohibitionists) have been defeated. Tourist trade triumphs. From Jamaica: "Free port prices, true. But you must shop around. Prices vary on identical things. Example: A Hummel figurine was \$15 in one shop and \$18.50 in another. A dozen name brand golf balls was \$8.50 in one Montego Bay shop and \$7.50 next door. I think wearing apparel is higher here than at home. Men's bermuda shorts in cotton/dacron were \$9.95. And I know you can get them for less in the U.S."

From Madrid: "When the British pound went down, so did the peseta. A U. S. dollar used to buy 60 pesetas. Now you get 70. Franco holds a hard price line on wages and hotels. So this should

help the American coming over here."

From a Pan American stewardess: "I wish people would carry change. We have to sell drinks, and there's a \$2.50 charge for earphones for the movie. We get \$20 worth of change for the flight. If a passenger pays with a \$20 bill, you can see what it does to us."

From Paris: "They say here that the 15 per cent discount for tourist buys is on the way out." (We bought with dollars or travelers' checks. The shop gave the discount. The Government allowed it off in taxes.)

The thrifty French found out about this. Began buying

dollar travelers' checks and getting discounts for themselves."

This just doesn't work. You can't rent a house long distance as you would from city to city at home. Mexican houses are not the same as ours. I saw one house listed as "three bedrooms." One bedroom was all right. The other two were bare except for a single bed and a bare electric light hanging from the ceiling.

What you want to do is go to the town and stay in a hotel. The next day go around

with a real estate agent. You should connect within three days tops. And have what you want.

Now for your towns: Guadalajara is the big town with suburbs at Ajijic and Chapala on the lake. Supermarkets and a Sears. Pleasant weather at 5000 feet. Cuernavaca is always spring at 5000. An hour from Mexico City by car. Flowers and supermarkets. San Miguel Allende, a little higher and chill in the winter. Has an art school and a supermarket. All have a lot of American residents. Not so well known: Morelia in the Michoacan lake country, a very pretty town but cold in the winter. Oaxaca, 300 miles south of Mexico City, is a pleasant Indian-Colonial town. I've gone through a dozen small towns that looked very nice. I have an idea houses for rent would be scarce though. And unless you have an American colony, you will get no supermarket.

"Where should I buy women's gloves (for gifts) in Europe?"

Spain and Portugal. All hand-made and very inexpensive.
