Rites Today for Youth Killed in Cliff Tumble

Funeral services were held this morning for 16-year-old Charles C. Boemler, 2604 W. 182nd St., who was killed Saturday night when he fell 150 feet at Bluff Cove on the Palos Verdes Peninsula.

The son of Mr. and Mrs. Charles C. Boemler, the teenager and a companion, Richard H. Irvin of 4556 Narrot St., were hiking along a peninsula cliff he lost his footing and tumbled to the rocks below. A Coast Guard helicopter picked up the youth and took him to Harbor General Hospital where he was pronounced dead about three hours after the accident.

Young Boemler, a student at Redondo Union High School, was born here May 13, 1950, and had lived here all of his life. At school he was a member of the swim and polo teams.

In addition to his parents, he is survived by two sisters, Jeannie and Sheryl of the home address, and his grandmother, Mrs. Lyda Hovey, Redondo Beach.

Cremation was scheduled at Pacific Crest Cemetery following today's services. The family has suggested memorials to the South Bay Community Church of the Brethren.

Planning for the project began a year ago when the federal government asked school districts to come up with "innovative" ideas.

ALTHOUGH funds will be handled by Torrance Unified School District, students from both private and public schools identified as needing enrichment services will be served. Students in the earmarked schools who are selected as most likely to profit from use of extra enrichment materials will participate in the novel venture.

There are three projects along similar lines elsewhere—a mobile library in Hemet, a mobile reading lab in Hemet, and a mobile audio-visual lab in a New Mexico school—but Torrance is the only district in the nation which will allow youngsters to take audio-visual materials home.

ASSISTING the librarian-bus driver in her record-keeping will be another novel innovation—a computer retrieval catalog. Information concerning titles of all media—books as well as tapes and filmstrips—was fed into a computer.

The result is a unique interspersed catalog.

In preparation for full-scale use later this month, the mediamobiles are being given a trial run at several schools this week. To familiarize themselves with the "blue geese" principals and teachers at the schools participated in an orientation session with Lankford.
