DR. HAN SUYIN
Visits El Camino

**Author
To Visit
College**

Dr. Han Suyin, author of the best selling novel "Many Splendored Thing," which was later made into the motion picture "Love Is a Many Splendored Thing," will lecture at El Camino College Tuesday.

The program will begin at 8 p.m. in the men's gymnasium. Tickets are \$1 for general admission and may be purchased in the college bookstore or at the box office Tuesday.

A distinguished doctor of medicine as well as a noted author, Dr. Han has traveled widely in China and Southeast Asia. A good friend of many Asian heads of state, she has a deep knowledge of the life and problems of the Orient.

BORN AND brought up in Peking, Dr. Han was educated there and at Brussels University. Her studies were interrupted by war. She returned to China, where she met and married her first husband, a general with the nationalist Chinese forces who was killed in 1945. After his death she returned to medicine and completed her studies at the University of London. In 1949 she took up practice in Hong Kong and has lived since mainly in Southeast Asia.

A contributor to numerous publications, Dr. Han also has had articles published by the World Health Organization and in many Asian journals. She has lectured at universities in both English and Chinese on literature and language.

Appearing as part of a three-day Women's Week program on campus, Dr. Han will discuss "Modern Woman and the Family."

Dr. Wallace F. Cohen of Torrance, dean of the Division of Social Sciences at El Camino College for the past three and one-half years, has been appointed a vice president of the college.

The appointment is effective next July 1. Dr. Cohen will be vice president in charge of instruction.

The new vice president, appointed by the Board of Trustees on the recommendation of a special committee, succeeds Dr. William H. Hartless, who will retire June 30.

DR. COHEN, who lives at 4926 Calle de Arboles, was the unanimous choice of the screening committee, which received applications from the post from throughout the nation.

The selection of Dr. Cohen was hailed by Dr. Stuart E. Marsen, president of the college and a member of the special selection committee.

A GRADUATE of Porterville College, Dr. Cohen completed work for his bachelor's degree at the University of California at Santa Barbara and earned his master's and doctorate degrees from the University of Southern California.

He was an instructor at Cerritos College, where he headed the economics department, before coming to El Camino. He also taught for seven years at Whittier Union High School.
