(Continued from Page One) and that parking requirements for such a commercial enterprise are not the same as those for a beauty college. The commission is to study the problems occasioned by a change in the use of developed properties and submit its recommendations to the council.

**IN OTHER** action, the council:   
• Continued until March 28 a hearing on a zoning variance to permit a drive-in theater in the vicinity of Crenshaw Boulevard and Pacific Coast Highway.   
• Adopted an ordinance which eliminates the need for a conditional use permit in cases where property owners

want to make improvements without changing the use of their property, provided the Planning Commission finds the improvements are not detrimental to the neighborhood.   
• Set March 28 at 7 p.m. to discuss salary proposals with representatives of the city's employe associations.   
• Accepted a petition from

residents of the 22600 block of Linda Drive asking that Linda Drive be closed to through traffic at Clearsite Street. The petition was referred to the city's traffic engineer, Art Horkay, for study and a recommendation.
