

Joslyn Classes To Open

Spring semester classes at the Joslyn Studio of Arts will get under way Monday, March 27 and continue through June 3, it was announced here today.

Classes will meet Mondays through Fridays from 9:30 until 11:30 a.m. and from 7:30 to 9:30 p.m. Mondays through Thursdays.

Special "Art for Children" sessions will be held at 9:30 a.m. and 1:30 p.m. each Saturday and a Sunday Painters class will meet from 2 to 4 p.m. each Sunday.

FRIDAY WILL be senior citizens' day and all classes will be open without charge to senior citizens. Classes for tiny tots will be offered in conjunction with morning classes. A fee of \$1 per child will be charged.

Registration for all classes will open next Monday at the Joslyn Recreation Center, 3335 Torrance Blvd. Fees will be \$4 per person for each adult class except the sculpture class, where an \$8 per person fee will prevail.

MORNING classes will be offered in creative stitching, papier mache, drawing acrylics, oil painting, ceramics, jewelry, and knitting.

Evening classes in oil painting, creative stitching, jewelry, ceramics, sculpture, and teenage art are scheduled.

Republican Candidate Quits Race

John M. Power, first Republican to announce his candidacy for the 46th Assembly District seat in the April 11 special election, has announced his withdrawal.

Power said he was withdrawing his name from the ballot and endorsing the candidacy of Mrs. Dorothy M. Chapel, widow of the late Assemblyman Charles E. Chapel.

"When I learned of Mrs. Chapel's intention to run, I realized that my continuing in the race would have the effect of dividing the votes of those who shared Charlie's philosophy and would increase the chance of conceding the district to those who opposed him in the past," Power said.

Wayfarers' Chapel Film Wins Honors

The motion picture "Wayfarer," featuring the Wayfarers' Chapel at Portuguese Bend, has received a Golden Eagle Award for 1966 from the Council on International Relations in Washington, D.C.

The film, produced by the Church of the New Jerusalem, depicts a wayfarer catching a view of the Chapel high on a hill overlooking the Pacific Ocean. New Open Meeting Law Approved by Assembly

SACRAMENTO — The Assembly has voted 50-15 for a bill which would make the Brown Act—an open meeting law for local government—apply to state agencies as well.

The measure now goes to the senate.

The bill, AB244 by Assemblyman William T. Bagley, R-San Rafael, is almost identical to a bill approved by both houses in 1965. However, that bill was vetoed by Governor Edmund G. Brown because of penalty provisions which it included. The penalty provision has been removed from Bagley's bill.

UNDER THAT bill, any action taken by a city council, board of supervisors, or other local body, at a meeting later determined to have been in violation of the open meeting law would have been nullified.

Most of the debate on Bagley's bill, and the opposition, concerned possible effects passage of his bill might have on the existing law covering meetings of local agency One

Unruh Bill Would Cut School Tax

Torrance school taxes would be reduced by 32 per cent under legislation which has been introduced in Sacramento, Assembly Speaker Jesse M. Unruh (D-Inglewood) said today.

Unruh has introduced the legislation, the "Property Tax Relief and School Improvement Act of 1967," as Assembly Bill 272.

Major provisions of the bill call for a one-cent hike in the state sales tax, with the revenue to be returned to local school districts.

Unruh said a current Torrance school tax of \$3.26 per \$100 assessed valuation could be reduced to \$2.23 per \$100 if his bill becomes law.
