

Visalia Duo Held Following Chase

A Visalia man and woman were arrested Thursday on suspicion of grand theft, burglary, and resisting arrest following a brief chase through the North Torrance area.

Delmer Quinton Brantley, 38, of 2718 Caldwell St., and Lois Elaine Brantley, 31, of 2071 Caldwell St., both of Visalia, were booked at the Torrance City Jail about 5 p.m.

He also was charged with battery.

POLICE SAID they first began chasing the vehicle in which the pair was riding when they spotted it near 182nd Street and Van Ness Avenue. The vehicle fit the description of one used by a couple which reportedly had taken a woman's suit from a Del Amo Center store, police said.

Officers said the vehicle accelerated when they attempted to pull it to the curb

on 182nd Street. A unit from the Gardena Police Department joined the chase and the fleeing car was halted on Hobart Avenue.

THE WOMAN got out of the car ran about a block before she was stopped, police said.

Several pairs of slacks and a suit believed to have been taken from a North Torrance department store were found in the vehicle, it was reported.

Brantley also is accused of "roughing up" two store detectives.
