

# Council Takes 'Second Look' At Travel Ban

The city's current ban on travel by officials may be in for some modifications when a three-man committee of the City Council finishes a study ordered last night.

Councilmen agreed to "take another look" at the self-imposed ban at the request of the city's Civil Service Commission. The commission, in a letter signed by chairman Larry Bowman, said the ban "will work a serious hardship on the city" and asked that it be lifted or modified.

Civil Service Commissioners want to send two representatives to a San Francisco meeting of the Public Personnel Association April 30 through May 3.

COUNCILMEN referred the request to a committee which includes Mayor Albert Isen and Councilman J. A. Beasley and H. Ted Olson.

The ban was enacted last Feb. 7 on a motion of George Vico, who was absent from last night's proceedings. It was triggered by Mayor Albert Isen, who said he felt it was necessary as an "economy measure."

Isen, however, has said he "never intended" to eliminate all trips by city officials.

LAST NIGHT, the mayor said he felt members of the council's advisory commissions should be limited to travel within the state and "not go chasing off to Dallas or some other place."

Councilman Ken Miller said the council had enacted a policy governing commissions and added that he believes the original policy is sound.

"But," he said, "it seems every third time around somebody wants to change it."

THE POLICY essentially permitted two members of a commission to attend a given conference, with a limit of two conferences each year.

The committee was asked to study the entire problem.

IN OTHER action last night, the council:

- Agreed to sell water lines formerly owned by the Moneta Water Co. which are outside the city of Torrance. The sale, which does not include pumping rights, will net about \$145,000 for the city. The Los Angeles Department of Water and Power and the Southern California Water Co. will purchase lines within their own service areas.

- Adopted, on final reading, an ordinance which exempts the Downtown Business District from the off-street requirements.

- Adopted, on final reading, an ordinance which simplifies the procedure for obtaining conditional use permits in cases where the use of specific properties will remain unchanged when improvements are made.

- Voted to hire Ken Porter to auction off city vehicles which are no longer needed. An auction has been tentatively scheduled for Sunday, April 16.

# Four Injured In Traffic Crashes

A 25-year-old Torrance woman injured Sunday afternoon in a traffic accident was reported in good condition yesterday at Little Company of Mary Hospital.

Donna Fulton, of 2422 Arlington Ave., was hurt Sunday about 1 p.m. when the car in which she was riding collided with a second vehicle at 229th Place and Arlington Avenue.

Drivers of the cars were identified as Danny C. Fulton, 24, of 2422 Arlington Ave., and James M. Fornelli, 18, of 22911 Arlington Ave. They were uninjured.

The Fulton's 15-month-old daughter, Diane, also escaped injury in the crash.

A TEENAGE girl and an elderly man escaped serious injury Monday afternoon when their vehicle collided at 171st Street and Elgar Avenue in the North Torrance area. Police said both cars were totaled.
