1. Start a regular program of care for the rose garden. Roses that are fed regularly will produce the prize winners.
2. Snails and slugs are active this time of year. Toss snail pellets throughout the garden and you will control them easily.
3. Citrus trees may be planted this month. Plant the dwarf varieties in tubs for decorative accent on patio and deck.
4. Select camellias now while they are in bloom at nurseries.
5. Subtropical fruits such as avocados, guavas and loquats may be planted now.
