Garden Checklist

- 1. If you envy your neighbor's flowering fruit trees, plant your own now for next year.
2. Tuberos Begonia bulbs may be started in flats of sand and peat now for potting or planting late next month.
3. Spray peach and nectarine trees to prevent leaf curl if you haven't done so already.
4. Plant a row of floribunda roses in one variety for a colorful, informal hedge.
5. The bare root planting season is waning. Plant roses, fruit trees and other deciduous material now while they are still available in bare root form.

All Sources of Income Subject to 1966 Taxes

Income from all sources, unless specifically exempt by law, is subject to tax and should be reported on your 1966 federal income tax return.

Such items as interest on savings and U. S. Savings Bonds, tips, most dividends, prizes, and profits from hobbies and from the sale of property are considered taxable income and must be reported.

Girl Scout Unit Camps In Desert

Nearly 100 girls who are members of the Los Angeles Council of Girl Scouts returned Thursday from a four-day camping trip to the Mojave Desert.

Preliminary camps were conducted in February at the Union Carbide Youth Camp in Torrance to select the 96 Cadette Scouts who participated in last week's program.

An all-day hike, an overnight hike for girls with experience in primitive camping, and a variety of other programs were conducted during the four-day session.

All equipment which the girls were permitted to use was provided by the girls themselves. Dehydrated food was used for all three meals each day.

This marks the sixth year in which scouts from the Harbor District have participated in the primitive camp program.

Funds for Sepulveda Approved

County supervisors have approved a \$130,000 allocation for the improvement of Sepulveda Boulevard in the city of Los Angeles, Supervisor Burton W. Chace said today.

Approval came yesterday. The money will be used to widen and improve the road between Western Avenue and Normandie Avenue.

"The two-lane street will be expanded to four lanes to handle a traffic capacity of 32,000 vehicles per day," Chace said.

The allocation is a portion of the funds currently budgeted by the Board of Supervisors to assist the 76 cities in Los Angeles County in the maintenance and construction of their streets which are of general county interest.

LEE SOLOMON Wants Tax Reform

Lee Solomon Wants State Tax Overhaul

Lee Solomon, Redondo Beach councilman and candidate for the Assembly in the 46th District, today called for tax reform in the Legislature.

"The time has come for a complete over-haul of our State tax system. As your Assemblyman I shall work for an in-depth study of our entire taxing policy. Property owners are long overdue relief of their heavy burden. Those who are on a fixed income or are retired, have been especially hard hit by tax increases in recent years. As a councilman I know the problems that taxes impose on the property owner, and as a businessman I know the tax problems that they face."

"A MORE equitable tax base must be found, one that is broad enough so that a fair share is carried by all economic segments in our State. We certainly do not want any group unjustly penalized, but on the other hand, we want to be sure that no group is allowed a special tax privilege."

"Instead of the current patch work adding of new taxes when new revenues are needed, I would propose that the recommended study emphasize the following points: (1) long range planning for anticipated new revenue requirements, (2) equitable distribution of the tax base. The latter requires looking into such factors as, the effect on lower income groups, business and corporations, and property owners—especially single family residences."

"TAXES ARE unfortunately a necessary evil, so let us be sure we get our money's worth."

Solomon will speak on Friday at the Manhattan Beach Community Church during their Candidates Night.
