Music Program Gets Approval of Board

A program of special musical concerts designed to create an understanding and appreciation of fine music has been adopted by the Torrance Board of Education.

The concerts, featuring professional musicians, will be offered to students in the fourth, fifth, and sixth grades during the next two years.

Dr. Kurt Shery hailed the program as "tremendous" Monday in urging his colleagues on the Board of Education to adopt a program which called for concerts to be staged next year in the district's 36 elementary schools.

Cost of the program which Dr. Shery asked be approved was \$12,960 for the coming fiscal year.

Trustees will spend the same amount of money during the next two years under the plan approved.

Under provisions of the program, Young Audiences, Inc., will provide three concerts in each of the district's elementary schools. A total of

18 schools will be visited next year, while the remaining 18 will be visited during the 1968-69 school year.

Following the board's action, Mrs. Janet Pollin, president of Young Audiences, Inc., told the board the group's board of directors would donate \$1,000 to help finance the concerts during the first year.

Blood Bank Scheduled At College

Students at El Camino College are out for blood and for good reason — they're rounding up donors for the American Red Cross Blood Bank.

The Red Cross bloodmobile will visit the campus Friday, April 10, from 9 a.m. until 2 p.m. A 12-bed blood donating facility will be set up in Campus Center.

Although primarily for students at the college, members of the surrounding communities also are urged to give blood, Karen Landreth, student commissioner of health, education and welfare, said.

"Each donor who participates is, at the same time, accumulating credit with the Red Cross Blood Bank which will protect him and his family in time of need," Miss Landreth said.

The present price of blood to non-participating persons runs as high as \$60 a pint.

Unmarried persons under the age of 21 must have written consent of a parent or guardian to donate blood.

Tears, Not Manliness, Most Helpful in Times of Grief

Tears — not "take-it-like-a-man" stoicism — are a child's greatest single need in overcoming deep feelings of grief or loss.

This is the opinion of two leading authorities — Dr. A. I. Duvall, noted psychiatrist, and Dr. James Gardner, widely recognized child psychologist, both of Los Angeles — as reported in a new study "If It Happens To Your Child . . ."

Written by John McKinley, president and general manager of Inglewood Cemetery Mortuary, the study is being published as a public service booklet this month. It is believed to be the first report to deal specifically, and in popular language, with the emotional problems that death — particularly of a parent — poses to a young child, and what adults should, and should not do, to help solve these problems.

McKINLEY EXPLAINS the major motivation for the study by describing one of the most frequently observed — and disturbing — of all child

reactions to the death of a parent:

"Tommy (a 5-year-old) was standing just as he imagined a man would stand, not crying, and doing his best to take his daddy's place," McKinley writes.

"In the two years since then I have watched Tommy . . . and it is clear even to my layman's mind that he is an emotionally sick child. I am sure it began when his mother, unknowingly, made it difficult — impossible — for him to express his grief, and placed on him an obligation he could not fulfill; that of 'taking daddy's place.'"

TO DEVELOP a set of "obviously needed" guidelines that parents could understand and follow in coping with a child's emotional responses to death, McKinley surveyed a number of well-known psychologists, psychiatrists, and pediatricians in the Greater Los Angeles area. Drs. Duvall and Gardner served as principal consultants.

Major findings and recommendations highlighted in "If It Happens To Your Child . . ." include:

- The words "don't cry" should be banned. A child faced with a deep, personal loss not only should be permitted to cry, but encouraged to cry until the need for tears is gone.

- Occasionally, the child may need to be "alone" with his or her grief. This feeling, if it comes, should be respected.

- "The child should be told the truth; that death is final." Describing death with the customary, unrealistic euphemisms — "gone on a vacation" or "gone on a long trip" — only adds to the confusion and delays the inevitable, say Drs. Duvall and Gardner.

- A child should not be unduly shielded from the fact and physical appearance of death; seeing with his own eyes will help him to understand — and to accept — what has happened. But, the consensus of those interviewed by McKinley is that this should be done privately. "The child should be protected from any mass demonstrations of grief, as from a large group of mourners."

Other intense and complex emotions — such as resentment, or guilt feelings — exhibited by children when confronted with the fact of death also are examined in the McKinley study.

Libraries Register New Gains

Circulation of books and other materials through the five Torrance libraries showed modest gains during February, William S. Gelter, county librarian, has announced.

Total circulation for the five branches was 55,526 during February, 1967, compared to 52,158 during the same month a year ago. Largest gain was registered at the downtown Torrance branch, where circulation jumped by some 10 per cent to 20,355.

Figures for the other four branches (with figures for February, 1966, in parentheses) are: El Retiro, 9,069 (7,598); Isabel Henderson, 11,557 (11,197); North Torrance, 8,453 (8,064); and WALTERIA, 6,092 (6,988).

Use of the Lomita library increased slightly based on circulation figures of 6,671 for February, 1967, against 6,336 for February, 1966. Circulation at the Gardena Library, however, fell slightly from 14,873 to 14,706.

Peck Park Plans Win Approval

Final plans and specifications for a landscape development project at Peck Park, 510 Leland Ave., San Pedro, have been approved by the Los Angeles City Recreation and Park Commission.

Bids for the contract will be received Thursday, April 13.

Plans call for development of a 1.25-acre site in the Summerland Avenue area of the park, and include grading, tree planting, installation of an irrigation system and construction of a children's play area.
