Life of Donated Blood Prolonged by Freezing

A deep freeze preservation system designed to extend the present 21-day life of donated blood "to at least two years" has been put into operation by the Red Cross here.

The system uses a newly developed "cytoglomerator" which will make it possible to freeze and thaw blood, Dr. Byron A. Myhre, director of the Red Cross blood research laboratory, said.

The problem, he said, has been to prevent ice crystals which break up the blood cells and make them useless for transfusion—from forming in the freezing process.

Dr. Myhre said the cytoglomerator, developed by Dr. Charles E. Huggins of Boston,

Mass., "enables us to cushion the blood cells in glycerin before freezing and then to wash the glycerin away when we thaw them out."

The process is very costly, Dr. Myhre said, and will be used to preserve only the rarest blood groups.

"Individuals with rare blood in their veins can now literally bank their own blood—with their own signature right on the container—against future needs," he explained.

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


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
