## Bank Shows New Gains In Profit

Net operating earnings of slightly more than \$10 million were recorded by Security First National Bank in the first quarter of 1967, it has been announced.

Earnings for the period which ended March 31 were up 9.8 per cent, to \$10,070,141, over the first quarter of 1966 and were equal to 88 cents per share on the 11.4 million shares outstanding, Lloyd L. Austin, president of the board, said.

Total resources as of March 31 rose to \$5.1 billion, compared to \$4.8 billion at the end of the first quarter last year.

Total deposits amounted to \$4,642,166,132 and total loans, less reserves, were reported at \$2,730,644,456. Time deposits as of March 31 were \$2,512,941,220.
