

Peninsula Chorale In Spring Concert May 6

"The Blessed Damsel" by Claude Debussy will be featured by the Peninsula Chorale in its Spring Concert, 8 p.m., Saturday, May 6, at Pacific Unitarian Church, 5621 Montemalaga Drive, Palos Verdes Peninsula.

This lyric poem is scored for four-part women's voices, with soprano and mezzo-soprano soloists, and has been adapted to the original poem of Dante Gabriel Rossetti by Frank Damrosch. Soloists are Judy Gregg, portraying the Blessed Damsel, and Glenna Campbell singing the part of the narrator. Mrs. Roland Amberg will accompany at the piano. Director of the Chorale, formed last September, is Ralph Prime, minister of

music at Neighborhood Church in Palos Verdes Estates.

A group of four songs "Of Music and Musicians," composed by Marshall Bialasky, chairman of the Division of Fine Arts, California State College at Dominguez, will be given a premiere performance by the Chorale.

The balance of the program will include five Folk Songs by Bela Bartok, a Shakespearean song, "Sigh No More, Ladies," set to music by Ralph Vaughan Williams; "Salve Regina," by G. P. Da Palestrina; "Adoramus Te" by Roland De Lassus, and "Lift Thine Eyes," by Felix Mendelssohn.
