Local sites where immunization against red, 10-day measles will be offered during a June countywide measles campaign were announced this week by Earl W. Kendrick, M.D., of the Torrance District Health Center.

Immunizations will be offered to children between the ages of 1 and 10 years of age at the following times: Thursday and Friday, June 1 and 2, from 12 to 8:30 p.m.; Saturday, June 3, from 10 a.m. to 4 p.m.; Sunday, June 4, from 12 to 4 p.m., and Monday, June 5, from 8 p.m. to 4:30 p.m.

An additional sign of a white star on a blue background is being placed on letter boxes in front of U.S. Post Office buildings and stations. The luminescent signs will enable patrons to easily locate the collection boxes during the evening hours.

# Recreation Department Offers Summer Program

How about that art class you always wanted to take, or that stitchery, sculpturing or drawing class you wanted to enroll in?

Or maybe you wanted to learn to swim, dance, play golf or tennis. Then again, maybe you wanted your children to participate in an outdoor activity such as an educational day camp.

If so, you may register for these and many other Torrance Recreation Department

activities at the summer program registration Thursday through Saturday.

PROGRAMS ARE designed for various age groups from children to senior citizens, and variety ranges from cultural and fine arts to sports and aquatics.

Children's programs include arts and crafts, basic acting, introduction to the theater, boys and youth choruses, dog obedience class, daycamp, and gymnastics and tennis lessons.

Programs for teenagers include teen modern jazz, art classes, acting classes, folk guitar, numerous swim courses, and mountain camping trips.

AMONG the programs for adults are ceramics, drawing, creative stitchery, jewelry,

## Watt Buys 3,000 Acres Near Palmdale Airport

Ray A. Watt, prominent Southern California developer and builder, and George Isaacs, specialist in the sale and development of western ranch lands and California coastal properties, today announced their companies have purchased 3,800 acres for future development 14 miles east of the Palmdale City Airport in north Los Angeles County.

Located in the central region of the Antelope Valley, the land has alfalfa fields, a small lake, and groves of yucca at an average elevation of 3,000 feet.

The land was purchased for an undisclosed price from the Chapman family, pioneer landowners, ranchers and real estate developers in Orange and Los Angeles counties.

Joining in the purchase were the George Isaacs Co., Caroldale, Inc., owned by the R. A. Watt Co., and Kamiah, Inc., owned by Boise Cascade Corp., with whom Watt is associated. Watt and Isaacs said they will announce their plans for development of the site within the near future.
