## Area Nurses Will Tour New Breathmobile Unit

Fifteen hundred nurses will preview the "Breathmobile," a new community health service, next Wednesday at 7 p.m. at a symposium cosponsored by the Tuberculosis and Health Association of Los Angeles County and the California Nurses Association in the Harbor, Southeast, and Centinela Valley districts.

Following a program in the Music Room at El Camino College, the group will tour the new 40-foot long "Breathmobile" provided by the TB Association through Christmas Seal contributions.

**PURPOSE OF THE UNIT,** Arthur W. Weiss, association president, explained, is to screen people for early symptoms of respiratory disease, including TB. Diseases of the lung such as emphysema and chronic bronchitis are now

a major cause of deaths and disabilities, Weiss said, and the "Breathmobile" will help find victims while treatment can still be effective. He said this is the fifth symposium for nurses held throughout the county to acquaint them with the "Breathmobile" service.

**TALKS BY** Dr. David P. Discher and Mrs. Rose Schlichter, R.N., of the TB Association staff will be included in the program. Dr. Discher is assistant professor of preventive medicine at the UCLA School of Medicine and Public Health and a medical consultant to the "Breathmobile" unit. Mrs. Schlichter is professional education consultant for the association. Chairman for the symposium is Mrs. Sarah I. Jenks, R.N., Inglewood.
