Estates of Area Men Turned Over to State

Helms of a former Torrance man who died in August, 1965, are being sought by Baldo M. Kristovich, Los Angeles County public administrator, to claim an estate of some \$18,500.

Kristovich said the Estate of Joseph F. Marks, who last lived at 1621 Date Ave., is valued at \$16,504.11. Marks was born in Massachusetts in October, 1886. He was retired at the time of his death.

Any person having any claim to the state should write to the State of California, Bureau of Unclaimed Property, P.O. Box 1019, Sacramento.

Kristovich also said he is looking for heirs of a Redondo Beach man who left an estate of \$13,758.49.

He identified the man as Michael Nowickow, who died in December, 1965. The man also was known as Michael L. Nowickow. A retired hospital orderly, he last lived at 702 N. Irene St., Redondo Beach.

Funds from both estates have been turned over to the state, Kristovich said, because no legal heirs have been located.
