Boys enrolled in South High's advanced auto shop class are demonstrating the success of their training in completing final adjustments on their required projects for the course, reports instructor C. E. Drips.

Students were permitted to supply their own engine, or were assigned one by the school, for the purpose of reconditioning. To bring the engine to designated specifications, the students disassembled the engine down to the last nut and bolt.

Auto shop program is open to all students, the advanced class requiring having previously taken elementary auto shop. Next year the program will accommodate 40 students in 2 two-hour advanced classes. A new auto shop building is now being planned.

Measles Vaccinations Given 91,000 Children

County health officials reported today that more than 91,000 measles immunizations were given throughout Los Angeles County during a special five-day crash measles campaign.

"I deem this accomplishment to be a direct result of a Health Department team effort, augmented by private physicians and thousands of community volunteers. This means that 90 children will not get measles encephalitis, 20 children will not die, and 35 children will not become mentally or physically crippled by this disease," Dr. G. A. Heidebreder, Los Angeles County health officer, commented.

BREED OF THE WEEK

Greyhound . . . The Greyhound has an authentic history dating back more than 5,000 years. This is undoubtedly the reason for the existence of a number of opposing theories as to the origin of his name. The most convincing supposition is that the name comes from the Latin term, Gradus, meaning degree or rank, for under the laws of Canute, King of England and Denmark in the 11th Century, no one below the rank of gentleman could own a Greyhound. The honorary appellation may have referred either to the hounds or to the owners.

A fine Greyhound is one of the most beautiful of all dogs. The breed's wonderfully balanced structure is the embodiment of speed, grace and stamina. Although the Greyhound has never been numerically strong as a show dog, only about 175 a year are registered with the American Kennel Club, the general high excellence of the breed has brought him best in show and group awards in the stiffest dog show competition. In the field of sport, the Greyhound has come to great prominence since the invention of the mechanical rabbit in 1911, making possible Greyhound racing.

THERE IS a popular misconception which I would like to nullify and that is the misconception that Greyhounds are stupid, that they are simply racing machines lacking the personality, affection, and responsiveness tending to make a dog a loving companion. Again, let me reiterate this is untrue and so unfair to a fine and handsome breed of dog.

The Greyhound makes a gentle, smart and devoted comrade. The Greyhound tips the scales at about 65 pounds and in height 26 inches.
