Dahlia Show Aug. 19-20 In Inglewood

Entries are still being accepted for the 36th Annual Inglewood Dahlia Society exhibition, scheduled August 19-20 at Darby Memorial Park in Inglewood.

The largest show of its kind in the west, the annual dahlia exhibition will this year feature more than 10,000 individual flowers, with growers from as far away as San Francisco and San Diego.

Show Chairman Herbert Pries emphasizes that exhibitors need not be "experts" or professional growers to enter. "There is a special class for backyard dahlia growers who are not club members and who do not necessarily know the particular name or type of dahlia they are growing," Pries says.

Ribbons and trophies will be awarded in all classes, and for information on the show, growers may contact Pries, or Louise McKelvey.

Darby Memorial Park is located at 3400 W. Arbor Vitae (near Crenshaw), and show hours are 2 p.m. to 10 p.m. Saturday, 10 a.m. to 6 p.m. Sunday. There is no admission charge, and plenty of free parking is available.

Under joint-sponsorship of the City of Inglewood and the Inglewood Dahlia Society, the show will also give those interested in growing dahlias opportunity to learn more about the techniques of raising the colorful flowers, various varieties, and floral arranging.
