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**Classified Employees Ask For More Pay, Benefits**

The El Camino College classified employees presented their salary proposal to Dr. Stuart Marsee and the board of trustees at the regular board meeting.

The combined salary committee of the California School Employees' Council presented recommendations for salary and fringe benefits pertaining for the fiscal year 1968-1969. Gordon Tuttle, committee chairman, stated, "The salary committee has spent many hours studying and evaluating the salary situation. As taxpayers, we are aware of our responsibilities and will not recommend unjustified adjustments in the salary rates or fringe benefits. We hope that you will agree with us that these requests are just and fair."

Gordon made the following recommendation:

- On comparing the positions on ranges 4, 5, 6, and 7 of the present El Camino College salary schedule with other schools in the district and neighboring colleges, we find these positions to be below average. We therefore recommend raising these positions one range, four to five, five to six, six to seven, and seven to eight.
- The comparison of the present classified salary schedule with previous years' schedules at El Camino College, and the comparison with schools in the district and neighboring colleges, indicate a need for salary adjustments. It is therefore recommended that an increase of 9 1/2 percent be granted.

Additional fringe benefits offer encouragement to employees of long service and a responsible use of sick leave.

- Benefits sought are:
- Extension of the present system of one additional day vacation per year after five years of service to equal 20 days vacation after 15 years of service.
  - A bonus of one day vacation for every 25 days sick leave accumulated in addition to the annual vacation.
  - Health insurance coverage for dependents, to be financed by the district.
- The members of the salary committee are Gordon Tuttle, Paul Galvan, Wayne Simpson, Shirley Bell, Deloris Tallman, and Peggy Ranslem.

**Instructor Seeks Seat On Council**

Max A. Kelly, a 38-year-old history teacher, is seeking a seat on the Torrance City Council in the April 9 general municipal election.

A history teacher at North High School for the past nine years, Kelly was born in Lincoln, Neb. He received his bachelor's degree from the University of Nebraska and has done graduate work at Nebraska and UCLA.

HE SERVED with the 3rd Division in Korea in 1950 and 1951 and taught in Columbus, Neb., before moving to Torrance.

He is currently a member of the city's Citizens Advisory Committee for Community Improvement. Other affiliations include North Torrance East Little League, Parents Organized for the Improvement of North Torrance, North High and Hamilton Elementary PTAs, the North Torrance Property Homeowners Association, and the South Bay Federation of Teachers.

HE SERVED, until recently, on the Harbor Area Teen Posts Advisory Committee and the Harbor Area Economic Opportunities Commission.

"I am constantly discouraged with the sight of youngsters climbing over fences to make use of our school playgrounds," he said: "I am convinced that, given a sincere effort on the part of the two local governments, all of our playgrounds and recreational facilities can be made available for maximum use by our children."

In the four years he has served since that election, his actions as a city councilman have borne out those assessments.

We said we were impressed by "the frank approach to all city business he has displayed."

We also dwell on the fact that Mr. Vico, as a member of the City Council, was among the first to question issues as they came before the city's governing body, and that his voting record was almost always on the side of the citizen.

"He's on nobody's ticket—in nobody's pocket," was about the way we put it.

Mr. Vico is nobody's patsy, he's nobody's rubber stamp. He is not a member of any power blocs, nor is his vote ever "in the bag." He does his own thinking and speaks his own mind.

We think this is very useful and would like to see it continued.

Without equivocation, we recommend that George Vico be re-elected April 9.
