Road to Be Widened For Thoroughfare

Improvement project costing more than \$200,000 which will help create a continuous east-west highway has been put out to bid by the Los Angeles Board of Public Works.

The project, Councilman John S. Gibson Jr. explained, provides for the widening of 223rd Street to a 66-foot roadway from Normandie Avenue across the Shoestring Strip to Western Avenue, the eastern boundary of Torrance.

The city of Torrance, Councilman Gibson said, plans, in conjunction with the County of Los Angeles, to open and extend 223rd Street westerly from Western Avenue to join Plaza del Amo Avenue.

This, he pointed out, will create a continuous highway from the Redondo Beach-Tor-

rance area to the Long Beach Municipal Airport, with access to both the Harbor and San Diego freeways.

The improvement, Councilman Gibson said, also will increase the flow of traffic and safety.


Bids will be opened by the Board of Public Works at a regular meeting April 24, with an early award of the contract expected.

Torrance Man Dies In Motorcycle Mishap

A skull fracture apparently ended the life of a Torrance man Thursday afternoon when the motorcycle he was riding collided with a car at the corner of Western Avenue and 213th Street.

Pronounced dead on arrival at Harbor General Hospital was Charles Everett Todd, 31, of 1341 W. Carson St., Apt. 12.

The young steel worker's motorcycle collided with a car driven by Rosina Anna Glessman, 62, of 3201 W. 134th Place, Hawthorne, just as the light was changing at the intersection. The Torrance Fire Department was dispatched to the scene to douse the flaming motorcycle.

Another intersection collision cost a Torrance youth several front teeth Thursday.

Walter S. Stewart, 19, of 1533 W. 205th St., was taken to Little Company of Mary Hospital for lacerations and broken teeth when his car collided with another vehicle at the corner of Crenshaw Boulevard and 178th Street.

Driver of the other car was Robert R. Hopper III, 22, of 3758 Redondo Beach Blvd., Apt. A. Hopper also received lacerations in the 12:30 a.m. accident. Both cars sustained major damage.

Adjusting to Dentures Key to Problem, says Dr. Campbell

Dental science has done wonders to make denture wearing easier than formerly. However, as good as dentures are today, they are still substitutes. But a denture wearer can make his denture problem a lot less difficult by following suggestions.

"First, you need to realize that nothing a man makes, as a substitute for a body part, is as good as what nature provided", Dr. Campbell said. "This is true of artificial limbs, plastic eyes, toupees, as well as teeth. You can condition yourself to the shock of loss of teeth by adjusting yourself to the idea that dentures are good substitutes. A comforting thought is that dentures are better substitutes than most other artificial things for the body".

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"Just as some people hesitate to see a doctor for fear they'll find something wrong with them, so denture wearers often hesitate to see a dentist when they need changes in their dentures", Dr. Campbell said. "Your facial contour may change as a result of shrunken gums. Your ability to chew will change. You can guard against premature appearance of old age by having new dentures when you first need them."

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
