CHICHICASTENANGO, GUATEMALA — Thursdays and Sundays are market days in this highland Indian town, and it's the most colorful market you'll ever see.

Overnight the plaza is jammed with tent stalls. Street corner stands. Sidewalk vendors of half a dozen eggs. Indians walk all night from their homes to sell green coffee and tan sisal rope. Brown sugar melted into cannon balls of sweetness. Red and green tomatoes and hot peppers and live chickens. Copal incense and homemade beeswax candles.

On the steps of the 400-year-old church, the Maya-Quiche Indians burn copal incense and make religious orations. (They do the same before the stone idol on the hill a kilometer away.)

The sun is warm. The air is cool and refreshing. And everybody is in bright tribal dress of their villages.

ARRANGE this trip with a travel agent so that you arrive the night before market day, and stay at the Mayan Inn. The most attractive colonial hotel in Latin America. (Tell the boy what time you want to get up and he'll fire up the fireplace at wake-up time. It gets brisk in the mountains.)

Buying tip: The market is full of handsome woven material. For a tablecloth and six napkins, the simple, bare-foot seller will ask \$8. Come down to \$5. And you can buy it in Guatemala City for \$4. (But maybe it's worth the extra buck to say, "I bought

"We read your articles or Guatemala, but from what we read in the papers is it safe to drive?"

Because of political troubles, the country is legally in "a state of siege." But I think this is really a political way of extending political power of the "ins." I had no trouble in seven days driving all over the country. I had the back of the car searched at an Army check point. But I never felt unsafe at any time.

(All mail on Guatemala takes too much space to answer here. Send me your address and a stamp—I provide the envelope)—and I'll send you a package on how to drive to Guatemala, places to go, what to see, what to shop—the works. It's free.)

"Do you bargain in the shops in Mexico?"

The department stores and supermarkets won't bargain with you. The Indian markets expect it and always have a big asking price. In between are the small tourist shops selling silver and candlesticks and bark paintings and so on. I surely would try to bargain in these places.

Mexico is no longer a place where everything is a good buy. You must do some sharp shopping and bargaining to come home with anything worthwhile. Get a price on taxis before you get in, too, if the meter is hooded. These taxis are permitted to charge what they like—and they like plenty.

"Those quickie tours of the outer Hawaiian islands—three islands, lunch, dinner, and sightseeing and back to Waikiki in one day. Where do you get them?"

You walk into any big tourist hotel and somewhere in the lobby, you'll find a travel desk. You buy it from them. About \$50 to \$75 as I remember.

"If we drive in Spain, is it possible to take lunch and picnic at midday? Or is it like this country with everything fenced off or 'no trespassing' signs?"

All kinds of delightful places to picnic in Spain and no fencing. Have your hotel put up some things in the morning. Take along a bottle of wine. And find some place alongside a river—there are lots of good spots. (Better invest in a knife with corkscrew and bottle opener before you go. And bring along a rubber bottle stopper. You should drink bottled water in the Spanish countryside. (Often you don't have a cork with it.)

" . . . the best buys in Italy?"


