### Air Force Major Wins Badminton

Major Robert Gerzine of Torrance, assigned to the office of Deputy for Satellite Systems of the Air Force Space and Missile Systems Organization (SAMSO), El Segundo, captured his fourth consecutive Air Force Worldwide Singles and second consecutive Air Force Worldwide Doubles Badminton Championship at the recent tournament held at Kirkland AFB, New Mex.

Major Gerzine retained the singles and doubles titles, without the loss of a game during the three day tournament.

Major Gerzine teamed up with Lt. Kent Mitchell, the runner-up in the singles event, to post wins over the Air Force Logistics Command, Air Force Academy and the Air Training Command (twice), to sweep the doubles crown without the loss of a single game.

Active in promoting badminton both within and outside the Air Force, Maj. Gerzine has for the past three years arranged for and participated with the U.S. Thomas Cup Team in providing exhibitions, and clinics for the instructors and cadets at the Air Force Academy.

This year's activities included an exhibition during the halftime of the University of Wyoming and Air Force Academy basketball game, which had five state television coverage.

The major also participated in the 15th Open Amateur Badminton Championship held in April at Fullerton. He successfully won his way to the finals by defeating 16 other competitors.

Another part of his badminton activities includes plenty of coaching for his two daughters, Gaye, 14 years, and Lori, 12. Both girls competed in the National Junior Badminton Tournament held in Wilmington, Del., the week preceding the Open Amateur Championship. Lodi came home a National Champion by winning the 13 year old and under Mixed Doubles Title.

### Swim Sked Told

Recreational swimming at El Camino College pool begins its summer schedule Monday under the supervision of college physical education instructors and student recreation leaders.

Swimming will take from Monday through Saturday and will cost 10 cents per period for children to 16 years of age and 25 cents a period for persons 16 years of age and older. No registration is necessary. The pools will be cleared between each swimming period.

Monday through Friday schedule is: 10-11 a.m. — Adults and children; 6-8:45 p.m. — Family hour (children 16 or under must be accompanied in the pool by a parent; 9:45 p.m. — 16 years of age and older, only Saturday schedule (adults and children): 8-10 a.m., 10-12 noon, 1-3 p.m.

All swimmers must furnish their own suits, towels and bathing caps for girls and boys with long hair. All swimmers must also be in the dressing rooms at least 10 minutes before the scheduled period. No tickets will be sold after the hour.

Registration for summer swimming classes at El Camino College will be Saturday at 8 a.m. in the campus center.

The program, under the supervision of college physical education instructors, will be divided into five two-week sessions beginning Monday and running through Aug. 23.

Sign-ups on Saturday will be for the first three sessions, only. Registration for the last two sessions will be held July 27 at 8 a.m. in the Campus Center.

Cost for the two-week regular session is \$1, but all swimmers must furnish their own suits, towels and bathing caps for girls and boys with long hair. (Swimmers must be in the dressing rooms 10 minutes before the scheduled hour).


Minimum age is 7 years and minimum height is 50 inches.

### Foli Is Player Of Year

Three South High ball players—outfielder Jeff Wang, all-purpose Steve Trudell, and pitcher Dick Foulk—were named to the All-CIF baseball team announced by Helms Foundation.

Wang and Trudell made the first team and Foulk was placed on the second team.

Tim Foli, No. 1 high school graduate involved in the recent major league draft (picked by the Mets), was named co-player of the year with Savanna pitcher Andy Bielanski.

Foli is a highly regarded major league prospect who led Notre Dame High to the Catholic League title and into the second round of the playoffs before losing to semi-finalist South Torrance, 5-2.

Bielanski, a powerful 190-pound junior pitcher-catcher of Savanna High's Triple A champion eleven, was 14-1 during the full 1968 season on the mound, while hitting .385 at the plate. Only a junior, Andy is expected to draw much attention at draft time next year. Andy boasted a 0.43 ERA in 15 games and averaged less than a walk per contest, while striking out 85.

Both Foli and Bielanski will be honored at Anaheim Stadium at the 32nd annual All-Southern California Board of Baseball Awards Program to be held prior to the California Angels-Detroit Tigers major league game of July 14.

Savanna, a comparatively new school in the Anaheim area, won its first CIF championship this year and wound up the season with a 22-4 overall record. The Rebels won the title by defeating Jordan, Long Beach (3-1), St. Anthony (3-2), Dominguez (5-2), Ramona (7-3) and Long Beach Poly in the finals, 5-1.

Six lower classmen, including co-Player of the Year Andy Bielanski, are listed among this year's honorees. Rowland High's heavy-hitting outfielder Ross Fink, who clouted the leather for an average of .446 is a first team pick along with Bielanski.

Smooth fielding Robbie Matthew of Chaffey is only a sophomore, while Steve Adams, San Geronimo catcher, and Rolling Hills pitcher Daryl Arenstein are second team junior selections. Westminster catcher Craig Weiler is a third team junior choice.

## Reynolds Named Athlete of the Year

El Camino College freshman Tom Reynolds is the college's athlete-of-the-year for his outstanding performances in football and track.

As a fullback Reynolds led the Warrior grid forces to a second place finish in Metropolitan Conference action with a 6-1 record.

The Morningside graduate rolled up 504 yards in 125 carries, while adding another 533 yards on 32 pass receptions. Reynolds also led the Tribe in scoring with 96 points.

In track Reynolds proved to be "a-man-of-many-talents." The EC iron man set and broke his own triple jump record. His first record-breaking leap was 45-10, which was bettered by a 46 1/4 mark. Reynolds established his record after having competed in the triple jump only two times prior.

However, Reynolds wasn't

a one-event man. His best times and marks include a 9.8 in the 100-yard dash, a 21.9 in the 22-yard dash, a 23-5 in the long jump, a 46 1/4 in the triple jump and 14-6 in the pole vault.

He anchored the EC 440 yard relay team which ended the year with a 42.3 clocking. He was also the third man on EC's shuttle hurdle team which posted a 57.7.

Reynolds totaled 122 1/2 points during the 1968 track season and scored 95 1/4 points in conference action alone.

Dan Felix, junior college state heavyweight wrestling champion, is El Camino College's outstanding individual performer for his accomplishments during the 1967-68 wrestling season.

The former Lawndale High grappler won the Metropolitan Conference title as well as the state heavyweight championship and took second

place to Cerritos' Bill Struve in the Southern California Sectional Tournament.

The state tournament marked the fifth match between Felix and Struve. Felix whipped the Cerritos matman three times, lost to him once and ended in a 1-1 deadlock in Metro dual-match action.

The Felix-Struve state championship bout also ended in a 1-1 deadlock. Felix won the state title on a referee's decision.
