## ...Let's Go

Some years ago, in 1959 to be exact, I met a most unusual woman. We were both members of a European Study Group that covered most of Western Europe, Poland and the Soviet Union as well. Her ability to adjust to any and all situations was amazing. There seemed to be nothing that could pose too much of a problem for this woman. During these past years, we have maintained a close correspondence and occasionally see each other.

This past weekend it was a real pleasure for us to entertain Mrs. Jennelle Moorhead for dinner in our home. For those who are in the PTA or watch television closely, her name will be familiar as a president of the National Congress of Parents and Teachers from 1964 to 1967. Last weekend she was in the Los Angeles area to deliver the keynote address at the Statler Hilton during the convention of the California Congress of Parents and Teachers.

The last time we had dinner together was in 1965 at the Nile Hilton in Cairo and the time before that was at the Inter-continental Hotel in Beirut, Lebanon. It was very exciting to visit with her again and hear of the ambitious study-travel programs that she has developed for the Division of Continuing Education at the University of Oregon. There have been several highly successful Study-Tours to South America and now she is expanding the program to

the Orient in the Fall of 1968. AS A PROFESSOR of health education in the Oregon State System of Higher Education, Mrs. Moorhead took a 3-year leave of absence to work at the difficult job of heading the National PTA. She was the first professional woman ever elected to the post, which is quite a distinction in itself. She was recently appointed to serve as coordinator of International Studies for the Oregon State System of Higher Education. This is the system that is offering wonderful study tours (with college credits) to South America, Europe and the Orient.

John Foster Dulles first appointed Mrs. Moorhead as a member of the U.S. Commission for UNESCO in 1957 and she still serves in that capacity. Since the Fall of 1966, she has been a member of the Commission's executive committee to work with the State Department on United States relations to UNESCO.

An extensive traveler, she has had an opportunity to observe conditions of health, child welfare, and education in many countries. She has visited many projects abroad sponsored by the Peace Corps, the Alliance for Progress, U.S. AID, and Food for Peace. Another interesting aspect of her work is her connection with the International Union of Family Organizations of the Teaching Profession.

THE TRAVEL-STUDY programs sound wonderful. The next one leaves for Ecuador, Bolivia, and Peru March 23 and is a month long study of the culture of these countries. The price of \$1,475 from Los Angeles includes all transportation, (airline, automobile and train) all hotel accommodations, all field trips and excursions, and all meals except those taken in Lima, Peru. What a way to earn three college credits—from Portland State College too!

Another interesting program is to study the Culture of Ecuador. That group leaves June 25 from Miami to Quito, Ecuador. This also is a month long study program—priced at \$769, which includes transportation from Miami to Ecuador and return, transportation within Ecuador, field trips and excursions, room at the Savoy Hotel, three meals daily and four college credits. West Coast people will leave June 19 and stop in Mexico City enroute to Quito but I don't know the additional cost.

If you are interested in either tour drop me a card and I will put you in touch with Mrs. Moorhead. She will personally lead these tours which will be quite a break for the participants. Sometime in June there is a National PTA convention in San Diego which will bring Mrs. Moorhead to Southern California again. This time we hope to introduce her to the fun and excitement at Disneyland.





## Supervisor Will Back Pay Hike

Supervisor Kenneth Hahn said today he will vote for raising the minimum wage for county employees to \$400 a month.

Hahn said higher costs of living make such a minimum wage mandatory for the "usually forgotten" employees at the lowest levels.

He said he will continue to fight for salary increases for department heads and other executives such as recommended in the Berry Report. "But it is only right that adjustments be made for the laundry workers, kitchen help, and other classifications which now receive a minimum of \$365 per month," he added.

HAHN ALSO has recommended that county custodians receive higher salaries after noting they are paid less than custodians working for other public agencies.

"Los Angeles County has always had the best custodians and we should pay them good salaries," Hahn stressed.

He said county custodians now receive less than custodians for Los Angeles City and the Department of Water and Power, and the city schools.
