Bishop Montgomery High will take a 2-game lead in the Camino Real Basketball race into Friday night's home game against Fermin Lasuen. The BMHS Knights clubbed runnerup St. Bernard's, 76-64, last night.

Montgomery overcame a 30-point performance by Skip Laurie of St. Bernard's. Four Knights, however, hit in double figures. Larry Wiggins had 27 points, Steve Patterson 17, Greg Collins 12, and Jim Roach 11.

Montgomery worked up a 42-37 halftime lead, scoring mostly from the field, but in the second half the league leaders got the ball inside to Patterson.

Some new faces appeared on the roster and some old one fell from the elite, but the weekly prep basketball poll remained essentially the same this week as Compton and San Luis Obispo lead their respective divisions.

The Compton Tarabes, after two easy Coast League victories, stretched their win streak to 22 games.

Which of two Bay League schools will compete in the CIF basketball playoffs may be decided today. North (7-0) has virtually clinched a berth, so it will be up to Redondo (5-2) and South (5-2) to fight it out for the No. 2 spot.

Santa Monica (4-3) is a mathematical contender, but Samohi's four victories are against the bottom three teams in the race.

Redondo is the favorite to team with North in the playoffs. The Seahawks' only two losses were to North. They

beat everybody else during the first go-around.

Redondo kayoed South in the Spartans' gym a couple weeks ago, 71-45, so it will take quite a comeback to retalliate in the RUHS girls' gym. The gym holds only a couple hundred people. A modern pavilion is on the drawing boards.

But even with makeshift basketball facilities, Redondo is equipped with a solid team this season and will have enough holdovers to rank first a year hence.

The type of team Coach Rex Hughes will field next

year includes Robbie Fowler, Phil Reese, Rick Shaw, Gary Graham, Bruce Gerhardt, Tom Box, and John Hansen.

Box (6-4) and Hanson (6-3) are sophomores. They have been playing regularly lately. At the present time South

boasts possibly the best player in the Bay League in Jim Owens. His high scoring has kept the Spartans in contention a year ahead of schedule.

It is next year when Coach Dave Corman expects his varsity to really jell. Returnees are Brent Barron, Mike Cloyd, Dave Miller, Steve Mistofsky, Jack Peterson, Barry Simon,

Dennis Rector and soph Jno Shuler.

For either Redondo or South to get into the CIF playoffs, it is considered a tremendous advantage for in-stilling confidence for next year.

BOTH the Sky League and Pioneer League will have two reps in the same CIF "AAA" playoffs.

Any of five schools, including Morningside, Torrance, Beverly Hills, Culver City and Leuzinger, are in the Sky League running. Torrance (3-2) and Culver

City (3-2) will probably eliminate one or the other Friday night during their game at Culver. Morningside (4-1) is expected to choke off Leuzinger (2-3), while Beverly Hills (3-2) should stay above water against Rolling Hills (0-5).

Aviation (5-0) should go undefeated in the Pioneer League, letting Palos Verdes (4-1), El Segundo (2-3), and West (2-3) fight it out for second.

West and El Segundo tangle Friday. The survivor can move up a notch if P.V. falls to Aviation.

Winter Olympics

A spectacular ceremony marked the opening of the 10th Winter Olympics at Grenoble, France, Tuesday. In the opening hockey competition Czechoslovakia defeated the United States team, 5-1.

After President de Gaulle pronounced the opening of the games, an elaborate ceremony includes a parade of more than 1,500 athletes and officials.

A military band paraded into the stadium to take up a position near the official Olympic flag. Fifteen minutes later, a second band appeared and went to a podium on the infield.

As soon as the musicians had taken their places, five helicopters flew over the stadium trailing red, green, black, yellow and blue smoke. The different colors of smoke represented the five colors used in the Olympic symbol of five interlocking rings.

At 5 a.m. five parachutists dropped onto the infield, wearing chutes of the five Olympic colors. Ten minutes later, a third military band arrived and passed before the official Olympic flag mast. Then the 300 Olympic hostesses in their colorful blue ski stretch pants, and red fur jackets with blue trim, went to the podium to be presented to the crowd.

An Air Force cadet band arrived, followed by a band and chorus of the Republican Guard. Then came 100 Republican Guardsmen in their blue, white and red uniforms with shining brass-colored helmets. They took up positions at either side of the stairway to the official stand.

The Air Force band finished its concert, and marched away, leaving the place to a Republican Guard band. All during the concert, Olympic Committee and other officials involved in the games arrived to take their places in the official stand.

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Gene Vollnogle Repeats As East All-Star Coach

Gene Vollnogle, football coach at Carson High School, has been selected to head the coaching staff of the East squad in next summer's Lions All-Star Football Game.

Vollnogle's appointment was announced by Don Banker, game chairman.

"Coach Vollnogle's fine work with the East team last year and his outstanding record at Carson High prompted his selection," Baker said.

Last week Fred Peterson of West Torrance High was named coach of the West squad.

Sixty of the outstanding senior football players in the South Bay will be selected to man the East and West squads. They will train for two weeks prior to the game. It will be staged at El Camino College, but the date has not been announced by the sponsoring West Torrance Lions Club.

Vollnogle's Carson team won the Los Angeles City Championship in 1966, and lost only one game in 1967. That loss was to Gardena, which won the Marine League title from Carson.

"Observers conceded that Carson was among the top three teams in the city last season and had the misfortune to be in the same league as powerhouse Gardena," Banker said.
