

Montgomery Gains At Least a 'Tie'

Skier Killy Eyes Triple

United States skiers regained some of their lost glory Monday, but Jean-Claude Killy, France's king of the hills, captured another crown in his race toward an Alpine sweep in the Winter Olympics.

Killy, the 24-year-old world champion who won the downhill race last week, added the giant slalom to his growing gold medal chain with a second heat run of 1:46.54 for a combined time of 3:29.28.

He now needs only a triumph in the special slalom Friday and Saturday to become the second man in history to win all three races.

America's Billy Kidd of Stowe, Vt., a silver medal winner at Innsbruck four years ago and plagued by injuries since, outdid even the great Killy on the second heat as he blistered the 57-gate, 1,780-meter course in 1:46.46, the fastest clocking of the day.

His performance moved him from eighth to fifth place with a combined time of 3:32.37, still out of the medals but reviving U.S. hopes in the special slalom.

Kidd was the highlight of the day for the United States. Jeanne Ashworth of Wilmington, N.Y., managed only a 10th place behind winner Johanna Schut of The Netherlands in the women's 3,000-meter speed skating and the best American finish was 27th in the biathlon, won by Norway's Magnar Solberg.

The U.S. hockey team scored its first victory after four losses by trouncing West Germany, 8-1. Canada beat the U.S. on Sunday, 3-2.

The Americans broke open a close game by scoring four goals in the last 10 minutes of the second period against Germany.

Murray Williamson, coach of the U.S. team, said after the game, "If we had started the tournament with this game, we would be hanging tough.

"We needed a game like this. We are not giving anything to anyone. From here on in, look out for the United States. We have got our legs. We are going to do some killing from here on."

In other Group A hockey, Czechoslovakia and Sweden pulled into first place with idle Russia with victories for 4-0 records. The Czechs walloped East Germany, 10-3, and Sweden topped Finland, 5-1.

Warm weather and rain, which has plagued the bobsled and luge schedule throughout the Games, Monday, forced another postponement of the morning and evening singles luge small sled races and the evening's first training run for the four-man bobs.

Cerritos JC Nears Metro Cage Honors

Cerritos, now towering over all contenders in the Metropolitan Conference basketball lead, can clinch at least a tie for the title this week by scoring two victories.

After rushing past East Los Angeles, 97-75, last Tuesday, the Falcons handily won their showdown with Long Beach on Friday night, 89-69.

Going into this week's games, Cerritos has a 9-1 record in the conference. With only four games to play, there may not be time to unseat pursuers Long Beach, Bakersfield, Valley, and Santa Monica all have 7-3 marks.

Yesterday's schedule included Bakersfield at Valley, Cerritos at Rio Hondo, Santa Monica at Long Beach, East Los Angeles at Rio Hondo, Long Beach at El Camino, and Bakersfield at Santa Monica.

Last week Cerritos socked East Los Angeles, 97-75; Bakersfield belted El Camino, 126-95; Santa Monica trimmed Valley, 98-82; Long Beach whipped Rio Hondo, 91-75; Cerritos defeated Long Beach, 89-69; Valley overwhelmed East Los Angeles, 118-92; Santa Monica topped El Camino, 117-72; Bakersfield stopped Rio Hondo, 93-79.

In defeating Long Beach, Cerritos avenged its only conference loss of the season and also held the Vikings to 31 points below their conference average.

The best scoring performance of the season was turned in by Bakersfield's Andy Hill, who had 45 points against El Camino.

The biggest change in the "AAA" poll resulted from Huntington Beach's victory over Marina to move into second place ahead of North High School of Torrance. Huntington Beach all but clinched the Sunset League title and has a 19-3 overall mark.


