

Chase Seeks Fifth Term as Supervisor

Supervisor Burton W. Chace today announced his candidacy for a new term as he took out nomination papers from the Registrar of Voters.

Chace said a special citizens committee will gather the signatures necessary to fulfill the nomination petition requirements and that he would file the papers immediately.

The veteran supervisor has represented the Fourth District since 1953. The district includes the entire 67-mile coastline of Los Angeles County, from Ventura to the Orange county lines.

"Each of the mayors of the 17 important cities I represent has pledged his support to my campaign," Chace said. "It is encouraging to have the unanimous backing of these city officials."

MAYOR Albert Isen of Torrance is on the list of officials endorsing Chace.

"Supervisor Chace is the best friend the city of Torrance has ever had," Mayor Isen said. "It is a pleasure to support him."

Chace indicated he would campaign on his record.

"I have consistently advocated economy in government in an effort to keep the burden on the property taxpayer as low as possible," Chace said. "I believe government should be run on the same sound principles as private business."

CHACE pointed to the development of civic centers, courthouses, health centers, libraries, and other county facilities in the Fourth District.

"As representative of a growing area, I have been successful in my policy of bringing the services to the people," Chace said. "The construction of a \$5 million courthouse and facilities for

other county departments in Torrance Civic Center is a good example.

Chace was appointed to the board in 1953 by then Governor Earl Warren. He campaigned for re-election successfully in 1954, 1956, 1960, and 1964.

Prior to his appointment to the board, he served eight years on the Long Beach Board of Education and eight years on the Long Beach City Council, including six years as mayor.

He has been elected chairman of the Board of Supervisors a record four times. He served on the Coliseum Commission and was its president during construction and dedication of the Los Angeles Sports Arena.

IN LONG BEACH, he is a member of the Kiwanis Club, Builder's Exchange, Chamber of Commerce, and other civic groups. He is a former lay leader of the California Heights Methodist Church and is past president of the Armed Services YMCA. A native of Nebraska, Chace was a buyer for a successful municipal bond business before moving to Long Beach, where he and his father established a lumber firm.

Chace and his wife, Polly, have two married daughters and six grandchildren.

Road Work Scheduled

Award of a \$19,892.92 contract to the Vernon Paving Co. of Los Angeles for improvement of a quarter-mile section north of the Dominguez Channel was revealed today by Supervisor Burton W. Chace.
