

# Spychala Ruled Insane At Hearing

Thomas Eugene Spychala, who believes he is the "victim of a national plot," was found to be insane at a hearing in Southwest Superior Court Thursday.

Spychala is the man accused of killing a California Highway Patrol officer last December in Palos Verdes Estates.

Four sheriff's deputies were on hand to subdue Spychala as he vigorously protested the way his hearing was conducted. He had wanted a jury trial, a right which his "Public Pretender" (defender) Roger Stanton had waived.

Spychala reportedly told psychiatrists that he was a gunfighter and jazz singer, describing himself as "one of the best guns in the West."

# Council Group Proposes Compromise on Sign Law

If the City Council's sign committee has its way, no Torrance storekeeper will be required to remove present signs to comply with new sign regulations.

They are confronted with the official Planning Commission version of the sign ordinance as well as a recommendation by the Merchants' Sign Committee.

Outspoken opponent of a stringent sign ordinance is Mayor Isen, who argued Friday that such an ordinance would frighten off prospective business. "We're a commercial city fighting for the sales tax dollar," Isen exclaimed.

The committee agreed to ban all sign abatement when it met Friday to hash over various proposals for a new sign ordinance. Committee members—Mayor Albert Isen and Councilmen Ross Sciarrotta and Ed Talbert—have been asked by the council as a whole to review the two main sign plans and report back their findings.

THE THREE committees also agreed to leave sign colors up to the individual merchant. No decision was reached, however, on proposed limitations on the size of signs.

HE SPEARHEADED the discussion against sign abatement, saying, "We don't want to spend thousands of dollars for lawsuits in enforcement."


