Terminating the bus line a necessary community service, Isen questioned the use of funds for the "fun and games" activities of the Recreation Department. The mayor pointed out that the city recently spent \$12,000 for restroom facilities at Walteria Park, wondering out loud how many persons actually use them.

Although Isen said he was not criticizing the Recreation Department, he pointed out that over the years, millions of dollars had no doubt been spent financing its activities.

PORTIONS OF Santa Clara Street were formally abandoned by the city of Torrance at last night council meeting. Councilmen voted to vacate Santa Clara Street between Engracia and Mullin avenues because the street is no longer necessary for public street purposes.

The city, however, will retain a permanent easement in the former street with the right to maintain and construct pipe lines.

A **BLUE CHIP Redemption Store** will be built on Hawthorne Boulevard following council action to rezone the prospective site for heavy commercial use.

Councilmen voted to rezone a portion of the property bounded by 227th, 228th and Samuel streets.

To protect Samuel Street residents from possible nuisances from the store operation, councilmen stipulated that all deliveries to the building and all parking lit sweeping must take place between the hours of 7 a.m. and 10 p.m.

In addition, a six-foot decorative masonry wall with no openings must be built on the Samuel Street frontage. All lights must be directed away from the residential area.

Supervisors To Honor City Clerk

Fred M. Arnold, Redondo Beach city clerk, has been honored by county supervisors for his 20 years of service to his community.

On the motion of Burton W. Chace, supervisors ordered a scroll be prepared for presentation to Arnold at a dinner in his honor March 21.

"Fred Arnold has been deeply involved in community affairs above and beyond his official duties as city clerk and finance officer of Redondo Beach," Chace said. "His cooperation with the county has been outstanding, and it is a pleasure to honor him."
