## Del Amo Center Hosts Virgin Islands Exhibit

A vivid panorama of vacation and travel in the U. S. Virgin Islands, built in a specially constructed 50-foot showmobile, will be open to the public Thursday through Saturday at the Del Amo Shopping Center.

The display, which opened in Washington, D.C., is currently being shown throughout the United States. It depicts the story of the Virgin Islands.

Thirty scale model displays and dioramas comprise the exhibit and animation, taped music, and narration are used to acquaint visitors with the life and history of the islands.

The Virgin Islands this year celebrated their 50th anniversary of their purchase by the

United States from Denmark. The story ranges from the discovery of the islands by Christopher Columbus in 1493 to present-day attractions. Hostesses from the islands will be on hand to answer visitors' questions about the Caribbean Islands and distribute literature.

In the 1700s Thomas Jefferson wrote a letter to his grandson, "As a teacher keep aloof from students as you would be from infected subjects of yellow fever or pestilence. Be a listener only, keeping within yourself the habit of silence, especially on politics."

But this is not the 18th Century, this is 1968, and students want answers to their questions more than ever before. The teacher's handbook states, "In the study of controversial issues in the public school, the pupil has the right to study controversial issues which have political, economic, or social significance and concerning which (at his level) he should begin to have opinion; the right to have free access to all relevant information including materials that circulate in the community; the right to form and express his own opinion on controversial issues without thereby jeopardizing his relations with his teacher or the school."

aren't being discussed now?" they replied: "In the classroom not enough time (usually none) is given to air one's opinion of the contemporary affairs and to get others' opinion."

"Teachers should be able to voice their opinions about school politics, religion, and moral aspects of situations."

"I feel that there are many subjects that should be, but aren't discussed in the classroom. For instance, religion, personal problems at home, and contemporary affairs (politics). School exists for the enlightenment of the individual, enlightenment in all phases of life, not just English and a limited variety of subjects."

"I FEEL teachers should be able to voice their opinions more in the classroom, especially concerning their feelings about teaching. Many of us are interested in teaching careers and would like to listen to other's opinions on the subject, and I can't think of a more valid opinion than a teacher's."

"I think that teachers should be free to discuss school politics if such a subject arises in the classroom. I think the students have a right to hear more about the procedures used by the administration in running our school and governing our activities."

"Time should be set aside for open and free discussion on the topic of sex. Also the moral and philosophical views of the subject."
