Vel's Enters Automobile In Mobile Economy Run

A Ford Thunderbird entered by local new car dealer Vel's Ford will be one of the 41 cars competing in the 1968 Mobil Economy Run April 2-7 from Los Angeles to New York City.

Competing in Class G (luxury cars), the Thunderbird will be driven by Nelson Stacy of Daytona Beach, Fla., aided by co-driver Dave Apple of Ypsilanti, Mich.

The run, sanctioned by the United States Auto Club, will make five overnight stops on its 3,000-mile northeasterly course from the Los Angeles area to New York's Times Square.


The stops are: the Grand Canyon, Ariz.; Colorado Springs, Colo.; Kansas City,

Mo.; Indianapolis, Ind.; and Washington, D.C.

Overall fuel economy winners will be judged in seven separate classifications based on the auto's size, weight and purchase price.

This year's run, programmed by USAC officials to include representative driving conditions normally encountered by the average cross-country motorist, will be the fastest in the history of the automotive performance.

Drivers will average more than 54 miles per hour over terrain which involves everything from stop-and-go city traffic and steep mountain climbs to long stretches of open highway.

Richie Guerin Is Best NBA Coach

Richie Guerin, who piloted the St. Louis Hawks to the Western Division title of the NBA, has been named coach of the year in the sixth annual poll of writers covering NBA basketball games.

Guerin, who wound up his playing career last season as player-coach for the Hawks, received 25 of 31 votes. Three coaches who received support in the poll were Bill Van Breda Kolff, of Los Angeles with three votes; Alex Hannum, of Philadelphia, with two votes and Gene Shue, of Baltimore, who received one vote.
