

Hollywood Gold Cup

The \$162,100 Hollywood Gold Cup, which has become known as the "Race of Champions," will have its 29th running Saturday at Hollywood Park. Records of the top contenders for this richest race in America for the handicap division indicate that the title is not an exaggeration.

William Haggin Perry's mighty Gamely, who etched her name in the Hollywood Park record book when she carried 131 pounds to victory in the \$79,650 Vanity Handicap, will attempt to become the third feminine star to win the rich Gold Cup. In 1967 Gamely was voted the national champion in the three-year-old filly division, and her record as a four-year-old has placed her far above her nearest rivals for 1968 "Filly or Mare of the Year" national honors.

At Santa Anita, Gamely was successful in the Santa Maria Handicap and Santa Margarita Invitational, and at Hollywood Park she has been even more brilliant. In addition to winning the Wilshire and Vanity Handicaps, she turned back Mr. and Mrs. Bert W. Martin's Rising Market in the \$57,050 Inglewood Handicap, a race in which she was the only filly in the field.

Rising Market has been the most prominent male handicap star in California this year, and his efforts to avenge his earlier loss to Gamely will be aided by a two-pound weight shift in his favor. In the Gold Cup, Gamely, at 120 pounds, will be giving six pounds on the scale to Rising Market (119) as fillies and mares are entitled to a five-pound sex allowance when racing against males.

Rising Market's biggest victories this year have come in the Antonio Stakes at Santa Anita and the Long Beach Handicap at Hollywood Park, the latter being his most recent start.

Indulto, lightly weighted at 115 pounds, is given the best chance to upset the top two contenders, as he has shown marked improvement in each of his starts at the Inglewood track this season. Now five years old, Indulto scored stakes victories in the east in each of his three previous years of racing.

Rowan and Whitney's Quicken Tree, weighted at 119 pounds, has won stakes races up to two miles, and the mile and one-quarter of the Gold Cup will give him ample distance to display his powerful stretch run.

Liangollen Farm's Racing Room, who equalled Porterhouse's track record for five and one-half furlongs in the recent Hollywood Express, will seek to follow in the former Liangollen star's footsteps when he goes postward in the Gold Cup. Porterhouse was successful in stretching out to a mile and a quarter and in the 1957 running of the Gold Cup was beaten only by the mighty Swaps.

All Eyes Are on Westphal

Probably the greatest high school basketball player in the history of California will be on display Wednesday evening, July 10, in the First Annual Southern California All-Star Prep Basketball Classic at Inglewood's Forum.

That could mean only one person: Mr. Everything of Redondo Beach's Aviation High, Paul Westphal. Paul, a 6-foot 2-inch 180-pounder who is equally at home playing forward or guard, is one of 48 outstanding players performing in the long-awaited basketball doubleheader that pits the Los Angeles City all-stars against the Westphal-led CIF Section 3-A club.

There just wasn't a better player to be seen in this part of the country last season than Paul Westphal. He led Aviation to a sparkling 28-4 record and the semi-finals of the 3-A playoffs. His team finally bowed to undefeated (32-0) champion Compton.

Compton coach Bill Armstrong, who saw Paul tear his defense apart for 38 points in that game, can now look forward to having his former prime adversary spark a talented 3-A team, which also includes one of his own All-CIF phenoms, guard Larry Morris.

It's an alliance that is making L.A. coach Jim Ryan, who led Manual Arts

to the city crown, a lot more uneasy these days.

Westphal, in the judgment of Aviation coach Ken Brown, is the finest high school player he has ever seen. "Paul is blessed with great balance and the ability to get shots off quickly. Paul can drive, hook, hit almost every kind of shot... and he's equally devastating with his left or right hand," says Brown.

"The thing about him that is most remarkable," Brown continues, "is his balance. He can shoot from body positions which would be overwhelmingly difficult for most better-than-average

players. If we had wanted to turn him loose in some of our games I think he could have made between 60 and 80 points a couple of times."

Younger brother of former USC player Bill Westphal, Paul became the first prep in Southern California history to eclipse 1,000 points in a single season. His 1,040 in 28 games was a 32.5 average and topped the previous high of 994 by Santa Maria's Steve Patterson (now at UCLA). Patterson recorded a 34.3 average in 29 games in 1966.

What's more, Paul missed 13 full quarters during the

season when Brown held him out to permit less experienced youngsters to play. Westphal also barely missed the career scoring record of ex-rival Bart Johnson of Torrance, falling 13 points short of Johnson's 1,917 points in 88 games during 1964-67.

Paul tallied 372 as a sophomore to first gain All-Pioneer League status. As a junior he notched 515 en route to All-CIF.

Last year Westphal collected all possible honors—All-America on three recognized selections, 4-A "Player of the Year" in a cakewalk, South Bay and Pioneer

League "Player of the Year," and "Most Valuable" trophies in the Pacific Shores, Covina, Hawthorne, and Inglewood Tournaments. He also won all-tournament spots three times as a junior.

Already lined up to enroll at USC, Paul was a highly-sought prospect. His final decision narrowed down to USC and UCLA.

Westphal's field goal shooting average was 67% last season and he hit 79% on free throws, plus chalking up 334 rebounds, 10.4 per game.

His league scoring average was 30.2 points a game.

Practice Near for Rams

It's called a rookie camp, but don't tell it to George Allen.

The Ram head coach has asked 18 veterans to join 21 first year men as the club opens summer training Wednesday at California State College in Fullerton.

Among the experienced hands reporting early will be quarterback Roman Gabriel as well as four players acquired in off-season trading. They include quarterback Milt Plum, flanker Pat Studstill and running back Tommy Watkins, all former Detroit Lions who come to the Rams in the deal for Bill Munson, and tackle Jim Wilson, who was involved in the trade that sent Bucky Pope to Atlanta.

Two other players picked up in trades with Atlanta, linebacker Bob Sanders and defensive back Ron Smith, will report Monday, July 15 with the remainder of the veterans due on the 17th.

After that it's only two weeks until the pre-season opener Thursday night, Aug. 1 at Anaheim Stadium against the New Orleans Saints. The Rams make their Coliseum debut Aug. 9 against Cleveland in the annual charity game.

One familiar face reporting with the early group Wednesday is defensive tackle Roosevelt Grier, who will be testing an injured achilles tendon that sidelined him all last year.

Other veterans checking in with the rookies will be defensive linemen Diron Talbert, Dave Cahill and Gregg Schumacher, line backers Tony Guillory, Doug Woodlief and Gene Breen, offensive linemen George Burman and Herschel Turner, tight end Dave Pivec, running back Jim Stiger, flanker Wendell Tucker and defensive back Kelton Winston.

No workout is planned for opening day. The players will take physicals beginning at 9 a.m. in the school's Othrys Hall, then draw equipment in the afternoon. The entire squad numbers 71—49 veterans and 22 rookies.

Last year the club swept all six pre-season games, then went on to post the best record in Ram history (11-12) en route to the Coastal Division title.

Boycott In Track Unlikely

A plan has been disclosed in which all black athletes who qualify will participate for the United States in the Mexico City Olympics—but will show their discontent by shunning the victory stand and possibly the opening ceremonies parade.

A newspaperman said the decision was made at last weekend's Olympic Trials at Los Angeles.

The newspaperman said, "I couldn't name one black athlete who will not go to the Olympics if he qualifies."

"But they decided there are other ways to demonstrate their disgust with their situation," he said. "I believe all blacks support the boycott," he said of the Negro masses.

Pressed for specifics, he said they have decided not to appear on the victors' stand, where the first three in each event receive their gold, silver or bronze medals.

"Very probably," he said, "they will not march in the opening parade of athletes of all participating nations, and perhaps not in the closing parade, either."

It was said there is no chance that Lee Evans, Tommie Smith, John Carlos, Bob Hines—to name five Negro stars—would pass up the Olympics, although they have been outspoken in favor of some type of boycott action.

"I believe all blacks support the boycott," he said of the Negro masses.



BOWLING with Dick Weber ALL-PRO CHAMPION

FOUR-STEP APPROACH IN BOWLING EXPLAINED

To assist bowlers with their game and improve their scoring, Dick Weber demonstrates the four step approach as taught by the AMF staff of champions.

Starting point. Place both heels at the foul line, take 4 1/2 brisk walking steps from the foul line and turn around. This is your correct starting position.



Stance. Left foot forward, right foot back. Stand erect, knees slightly bent. Support the weight of the ball in both hands. Place your fingers and thumb into the proper holes and hold the ball to the right side.

First step, the pushaway, is the first and most important step. As you move your right foot forward, push the ball forward and down in an arc easy motion.

Second step. Once in an arc motion, the ball starts into the backswing. Keep your arm close to your body. Move your left foot forward. Your left arm swings away to a natural balancing position.

Third step. The ball reaches the top of the backswing, not above shoulder level. The right foot is forward, shoulders parallel to the foul line. Lean forward and down.

Fourth step. As your left foot slides, your right arm comes forward in one simultaneous motion. Perfect timing is achieved when
