It's hard to tell about hillbillies but Irene Ryan, the wily little actress who portrays her, is 62.

"We've heard a lot about violence on TV, how the public is fed up with it, the producers don't like it, and the network executives are against it. If all this is true, then why do we HAVE it?"

"Do the actors in cigarette commercials actually smoke?"

If they don't they're not likely to admit it. In the thirties Bing Crosby appeared in a cigarette ad which backfired when it was learned that he didn't smoke. Since then most ad agencies have used only legitimate smokers.

It's a quick and easy solution to most dramatic situations and it's the only thing that doesn't offend any minority or aggravate a prospective purchaser.
