Welfare Offered

A two-year program leading to an associate in arts degree with a major in social welfare is now being offered at Los Angeles Harbor College.

A student graduating from the program is equipped to work in both public and private agencies connected with social welfare and rehabilitation. This provides a unique opportunity, according to Mrs. Lenore Eisenstein of the home economics department, for students who are interested in social work but are unable to continue in the full four or five year college course.

Mrs. Eisenstein indicates that growth in welfare services have opened up many positions in the field. The curriculum involves a combination of courses in sociology, psychology, and home economics.

Other programs offered under the home economics department are nursery school education, home economics, fashion design and merchandising.

Firefighter Earns Medal for Heroism

Los Angeles City Fireman Stuart Welch, a Torrance resident, has been awarded the distinguished Medal of Valor, the highest form of recognition and commendation made within the fire service.

Welch was presented the medal during the Award of Valor Luncheon sponsored by the Los Angeles Junior Chamber of Commerce. The ceremony was attended by a crowd of more than 800 persons, which included Mayor Sam Yorty, along with most of Los Angeles' top officials.

The Medal of Valor is awarded by the Los Angeles Board of Fire Commissioners to members of the department who have performed an act under conditions of "extreme" personal risk.

FIREMAN WELCH was awarded the Medal of Valor as a result of his performance during a rescue incident which occurred on Nov. 21, 1967, at the intersection of Orange Drive and Edgewood Place, Los Angeles.

This intersection became flooded with approximately six feet of water due to very heavy rainfall.

Suddenly an auto, southbound from La Brea, was noticed heading for the intersection. It was obvious that the woman driving could not stop and the vehicle plunged into the deep water and began to float.

Fireman Welch and a police officer immediately waded out to the auto, which began to submerge.

ALTHOUGH the running waters hampered rescue procedures, Fireman Welch was able to force the door open and thus pull the woman from the vehicle. By this time the water level was up

to the roof line. They managed to get the woman to high ground, which was a difficult task due to the rushing current.

A special board of chief officers of the Los Angeles City Fire Department investigated the incident and concluded that Fireman Welch had acted under conditions of extreme personal risk to save a life and therefore deserved the department's highest commendation—the Medal of Valor.

Slow Drivers Invite Citations on Streets

"Slow drivers who are impeding traffic are not only a menace but are inviting a citation, Capt. P. J. Ford, South Los Angeles area commander of the California Highway Patrol, has warned.

The vehicle code requires any vehicle moving slower than the normal flow of traffic to be driven in the right lane of the roadway, or as far to the right as is practicable.

"On freeways or other multi-lane highways, this means you must keep pace with the flow of traffic in the lane you are using or move into the lane to your right," Captain Ford said. "But even when you are in the far right-hand lane, you must not drive so slowly that you impede the cars behind you."

and allow the following vehicles to pass.

"Of course, there are times when a slow speed is necessary for safe driving, but drivers should remember that generally they must not drive so slowly as to be a danger on the road, or to interfere with the normal or reasonable movement of traffic.

"If a long line of cars has formed behind you on a two-way two-lane road, or if cars are changing lanes to pass you on the right on a freeway, you're in trouble," the Captain concluded.



Radio Club Will Meet
