

Education Programs Play Key Role in New Section

(Editor's note: This is the third in a three-part series on local activities of the Los Angeles County District Attorney's Office.)

The Field Operations Section was established by District Attorney Evelle J. Younger to promote increased and improved communications between the public and law enforcement. It is also charged with the responsibility of developing and implementing public education and community action programs aimed at controlling and preventing crime, he notes in the District Attorney's annual progress report.

Advisory Council is composed of community leaders from 77 cities and other areas of the county, serving as a support group to the District Attorney's Office in developing and aiding implementation of crime control and prevention programs.

ONE OF THE most important committees of the Council is concerned with legislation, and committees in each Assembly District in the county develop and generate support for legislation designed to assist law enforcement.

Heading the committee in the Torrance area Assembly Districts are: Mathew W.

Rae Jr. and George W. Smith (46th District) Donald H. Davidson (67th District), and Otilio Barron (68th District).

"With the direct support of these committees," said District Attorney Younger, "we are able to show substantial accomplishments in giving law enforcement better legislative tools."

AMONG THE recent victories the legislative committee noted were support for statutes in Juvenile Court reforms, additional protection for the People in the highly technical field of search and seizure and definitive standards for more realistic prosecution in medical quackery cases.

"No other law enforcement agency in the nation," continued the District Attorney, "has a more productive citizen participation and support program."

Another group aiding the District Attorney is the Advisory Council's youth committee, which assists the District Attorney's Young Citizens' Council.

Heading this work in Region II are U. S. Griggs of Los Angeles, chairman; and Marguerite Justice, Los Angeles; and Dr. John T. Burroughs, Inglewood.

YOUTH involvement is another phase of field operations, and the District Attorney's Young Citizens'

Council was organized to improve communication and understanding between youth and the authority structure—especially law enforcement.

Leading the DAYCC are Bernard Nicholas of San Pedro High School and Jane Casserly of Marymount High School.

Last year, this group was expanded by the development of crime prevention committees of 10 to 25 students at more than 100 participating high schools.

THEIR CONCERNS have been crystallized into 11 action proposals and one of the main goals—the formation of a teenager speakers'

bureau on narcotics prevention—has been very successful, said Younger.

Also noted by Younger were the program consultant staff, composed of 20 persons with an interest in youth and crime prevention and "Operation Cool Head," which in past summers reached more than 30,000 young people in an effort to stress personal responsibility and constructive activity during summer vacations. A big contributor was the bowling industry which made available their facilities to thousands of young people without charge.

The Field Operations Section was also responsible for the preparation and distribution of three education booklets: The Bettered Child, Operation on Guard and On the Alert.

Another public information program instituted last year was the Danger Days Campaign in December to inform the public of the dangers involved in the high increase of crime during the holiday season.

In the Annual Progress Report, District Attorney Younger commented that "the district attorney as the chief prosecutor of the county must, in addition to prosecuting those criminals that are apprehended, provide leadership and legal and investigative staff assistance to local law enforcement agencies and crime prevention programs."

In a message to employees, he said "... through your individual efforts we have continued to reorganize and modernize this department and have become more effective and proficient in both prosecution and our crime prevention and control programs."


