Area Firm Awarded Contract

The Cosmodyne Corp. has been awarded a contract in excess of \$2.5 million for mobile liquid oxygen/liquid nitrogen generating plants for use by the U. S. Marine Corps and Air Force.

The new Model GB-1A mobile generating plants will be produced by Cosmo- dyne's Torrance Division. First units of the new con- tract will be delivered in one year.

The units produce the liquefied gases from the air, utilizing temperatures as low as 320 degrees below zero in the process. By stor- ing the gasses oxygen and nitrogen as dense cryogenic (ultra-cold) liquids in light- weight containers, signifi- cant size and weight reduc- tions are possible over the older method of high-pres- sure gas storage in very light steel cylinders. A half-pound of oxygen gas, for example, requires a 45- gallon container, but the same amount in liquid form would barely fill an ordi- nary drinking glass.

Elderly Invited To 'Health Day'

A community health day for senior citizens will be held Wednesday from 12:30 to 4 p.m. at the Torrance Recreation Center, 3341 Torrance Blvd.

The program will include presentations by major public and private agencies to inform older persons about various health problems, their symptoms, prevention, and treatment.

Admission is open to the general public with no charge. In addition to the exhibits and speakers, films will be shown dealing with arthritis, emphysema, blind- ness, diabetes, and heart dis- ease.

Participating organizations include the Los Angeles Heart Association, Ameri- can Cancer Society, Dia- betes Association, Southern California Hearing Council, Social Security Adminis- tration, and Tuberculosis As- sociation.

Also part of the health day will be testing of indi- viduals over 50 for glauco- ma, diabetes, blood pres- sure irregularities, respira- tory and hearing problems, all under the supervision of local physicians who are donating their services.

More than 225 men and women have signed up for the testing which will be open only to those who have already pre-registered.

The health program is sponsored by the Torrance Committee on Aging, with the cooperation of the County Department of Senior Citizens Affairs, County Health Department, and Torrance Recreation and Parks Department.
