

Passes Score Big for Montgomery



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Dick Bass' Milestones

When Dick Bass finally quits playing football for the Los Angeles Rams he's got a nice surprise waiting for him: he'll find out how famous he has become in the field of sports.

The newest member of pro football's exclusive 5,000-yard club (11 members in the NFL, one in the AFL, have rushed for a lifetime total of 5,000 yards or more) Bass has no idea how many trophies he's won or game balls he's been given, or what the press has been saying about him all these years. He has his own philosophy about such things.

"I try to ignore the honors or writeups as long as I'm playing," he says. "I don't believe it's good to think about them now. When I retire, then it'll be time enough to look at them."

"Meanwhile, I send them all to my mother and father in Vallejo. They have the game balls and trophies and plaques on a big mantlepiece, and they keep up the scrapbooks. My father subscribes to all the papers and sports magazines."

"When I visit them in Vallejo my mother tries to show me the collection, but I won't look at it—not yet. All that really matters now is the next game coming up. I was too happy beating the Steelers last Sunday to get a thrill over hitting the 5,000-yard mark. I thought about it some until Tuesday, then I put it out of my mind. It isn't going to help me against the Browns at Cleveland Sunday afternoon."

The Ram-Brown game will be televised back to Los Angeles via KNXT (Channel 2), starting at 10:30 a.m.

Despite Dick's protestations, it is safe to say the memory of that moment when he plunged four yards through the middle of the Pittsburgh line to reach the 5,000-yard plateau will not soon fade.

"Coach (George) Allen told me in the dressing room at half-time that he didn't like special ceremonies during a game, but he'd make an exception this time if I passed the mark. When it happened, referee George Renix presented me with the ball and said, 'I hope this gets you a good bonus on your next contract.'"

World Series Draws Near

Bob Gibson broke the National League record for lowest earned run average with a six-hit shutout that gave the St. Louis Cardinals a 1-0 victory over Houston Friday night.

The 33-year-old Cardinal righthander turned in his 13th shutout of the season and struck out 11.

Gibson, 22-9, making his last start before the World Series, lowered his ERA to 1.12, breaking the record of 1.22 held by Grover Cleveland Alexander of the Philadelphia Phillies in 1913.

Hub Leonard of Boston holds the major league ERA record of 1.01 for 222 innings set in 1914.

Julian Javier scored the only run Gibson needed in the fifth inning. Javier walked to lead off the inning. Gibson sacrificed and Curt Flood singled him in off loser Larry Dierker, 12-15.

Gibson, whose 22 victories is the most he has ever won in the majors, broke the league ERA record for 300 or more innings pitched. Walter Johnson set the mark of 1.14 in 1913 with Washington. Gibson has pitched 304 innings.

Ferdie Schupp of the Giants compiled an 0.90 mark in 1916 but he pitched only 140 innings and Alexander, who pitched 376 innings in 1916, is considered the ERA leader that season with his 1.55 mark.

Gibson is expected to start for St. Louis (96-64) against Denny McLain of the Detroit Tigers (104-57) on Wednesday.

Maury Wills in the News

Maury Wills of the Pittsburgh Pirates has changed his mind about retiring and ended a one-day feud with the management Friday. He rejoined the ball club in Chicago yesterday.

At a news conference in the offices of the Pittsburgh mayor Joseph M. Barr, Wills said he was rejoining the team "mainly because I don't want to be accused of letting the club down and letting down my fellow players."

"But I definitely will retire after the season particularly if I am not protected in the expansion draft," he said. "I want to stay in Pittsburgh and I have a lot of friends here."

Wills admitted he was wrong in not reporting for a club physical — an incident which triggered the retirement announcement Thursday night. He was fined \$150 for not showing up for an orthopedic examination, which was required of all Pirate players in accordance with a club policy laid down six years ago.

Knights Topple South High, 34-6

Passing for four touchdowns, Bishop Montgomery High rolled up a 34-6 non-league football victory against South High Friday night on the victors' turf.

Touchdown passes of 11, 18 and 29 yards were thrown by senior quarterback Greg Collins and sub Jeff Annis connected on a 3-yarder in the fourth period.

Montgomery went out in front, 13-0, in the first quarter, but the Spartans got right back in the game on a 70-yard run by junior half-back Bruce Johnson.

Except for a sparkle of passing from QB Sam Robertson to Steve Vico, South was stymied by the Knights.

After five minutes into the game, Bishop got its offense going with Collins firing a screen pass to Jim Agnew for 25 yards. Agnew, a junior, was prevented from scoring on a downfield tackle by Eric Langdon on the 14.

But three plays later Collins found Greg Reams open in the end zone and pitched an 11-yard strike at him.

The second TD followed the recovery of a South fumble at the 45 and after two runs by Ed Hansen, Nick Vargas ran 14 yards to the end zone.

Dennis Haren missed the only one of five place kicks.

With the score 13-0 and South having a first down its own 30, Johnson took a handoff, went wide and streaked the length of the east sideline surrounded with good blocking.

The size of the score was to show in Montgomery's next series, running and passing almost at will. Reams put the finishing touches on the drive when he broke clear with an 18-yard touchdown pass from Collins.

In the second half Vargas took a 29-yard pass from Collins to culminate a 53-yard drive.

It looked like Vargas had another 19-yard TD pass on an opportunity set up by Dennis Haren's fumble recovery, but a penalty nullified the score. The Knights then stayed on the ground and got far as the 4-yard line.

Annis directed the Knights in the fourth period. Two penalties helped in the

touchdown drive. The quarterback threw to Mike Sequeira in the end zone for six.

South fumbled away the football after getting inside the Montgomery 5 in the final 21 seconds.

Montgomery had 14 completed passes for 214 yards. Total yardage figures were 400 to 168 for Bishop.

Coach George Swade of the Knights said Vargas was outstanding going both ways. He said Bill Copeland, John Thompson, Don Rowell, Brad Kerwin, and Center George Dumphy did a good job.

Bishop Montgomery opposes Camino Real League favorite Crespi in next Friday's league opener at home.

South returns home for a Bay League opener against West High, the newcomer to the league.
