### Around the World with Stan Delaplane

**CHIHUAHUA MEXICO**—The border stations have been busier with American drivers headed for Mexico City and the Olympics. (And maybe some hand-to-hand between cops and students.)

The student revolt hasn't spread into northern Mexican states — "the breeding ground of revolutions." If you drive through this route, stop off and see Luz Corral, the widow of Pancho Villa. She has a little Villa museum in his old home — pistols, cap and sword with the poem carved on the blade.

Four hours south, stop at Hidalgo de Parral where Villa was ambushed. The place where they got him from behind the hay bales is marked with a plaque. And there's a stone with a florid inscription in the local cemetery.

This is an old silver town. A few long-haired, killed Tarahumara Indians come in from the wild Sierra Madre. And on Saturday night, there are usually a couple of barroom shootings when the cowboys come to town. Two fair hotels. Food is passable and hot as a firecracker.

"We plan to drive down to Mexico City and wonder if we will have trouble getting rooms enroute . . ."

I don't think so. I would chance it. It is off-season now. And Mexico has enough highway hotels and motels to take care of on-season traffic. I surely wouldn't figure on getting into Mexico City without reservations. Not until the Olympics are over.

That goes for Acapulco, Cuernavaca, Taxco — anything within range of Mexico City.

"We've heard that you should give some money to the Mexican border officials when you cross . . ."

That's been the custom for years. But this time, I noticed the immigration man who made out my tourist card didn't expect it. (I gave him a dollar anyway.) The man who made out my car permit was the same. (He got a buck, too.)

Apparently, you can do it or not. (I guess I do it because I've got the custom.) It is not and never was custom to drop money on the two or three inspection stations farther down from the border. They only stop you to see that you haven't broken the seals on your luggage.

If you are stopped in Mexico by a policeman, it is Mexican custom to ask, "Could I pay the fine to you, Officer?" This is not consid-

"Are Mexican roads well-marked? Or will we need maps?"

You can get a free map by writing Dan Sanborn, Mc Allen, Texas. (Who sells Mexico car insurance which you must have.) He will mark the best route for you on it if you ask. (So be a sport and buy your insurance from him.)

The roads are well-marked. Distances in kilometers. (For miles: km times 6 and drop the last digit.) Curves are marked, but not temporary obstructions like a load of gravel in the middle of the road. So don't drive at night.

There are also signs: "Don't leave rocks on the pavement." This is to truck drivers who block up a stalled truck with boulders and later drive away. You seldom see these signs without also seeing several huge rocks on the highway. Maybe it reminds them to PUT rocks on the road.

"Or would it be better to fly down and rent a car?"

You'll save \$200 to \$300 by flying and renting. Air fares to Mexico are cheap — Western, American, Eastern, Aeronaives. And that's a long drive down. But I like to drive in Mexico.
